(Standing Orders For Convention)

In order that the proceedings of the Convention be carried out without delay, the following Standing Orders will be observed:

- 1. The Proposer of a Resolution or of an Amendment thereto may speak for five minutes, but not more than five minutes.
- 2. A Delegate speaking to a Resolution or an Amendment must not exceed three minutes.
- 3. The Proposer of a Resolution or of an Amendment may speak a second time for three minutes before a vote is taken, but no other Delegate may speak a second time to the same Resolution or Amendment.
- 4. The Chairman may, at any time he considers a matter has been sufficiently discussed, call on the Proposer for a reply, and when that has been given a vote must be taken.
- 5. A Delegate may, with the consent of the Chairman, move 'that the question be now put', after which, when the Proposer has spoken, a vote must be taken.
- 6. Standing Orders shall not be suspended for the purpose of considering any matter not on the Clár, except by the consent of a majority equal to two-thirds of those present and voting.

7.5 Fiona Teague, Chairperson of the Health & Wellbeing subcommittee, requested that the County's Critical Incident Response Plan that was issued to all Clubs in advance of Convention, be adopted. This was accepted on the proposal of M Harvey which was seconded by J Rafferty.

7.6 G Byrne paid tribute to the Hurling Officer on his achievement in having three new Clubs established and in securing new funding from Croke Park; he also congratulated all who had worked to make a success of the joint U12 football and hurling leagues during the year

8.0 County Grounds' Accounts and Balance Sheets

- 8.1 The Accounts for Healy Park Omagh and O'Neill Park Dungannon were included with the Treasurer's Report and presented by Raymond McKeown (Cisteoir). Total income for Healy Park was £19,877 (a 19% decrease on 2016) and the total expenditure amounted to £56,359 providing an operating loss of £36,482 for the year ending 31st October.
- 8.2 The Accounts for O'Neill Park Dungannon indicated a total income of £4,550 which was comparable to that of 2016, and an expenditure of £25,907 giving a deficit of £21,357 for the year.
- 8.3 In response to a query from M Harvey, the Treasurer confirmed that the finances for Healy Park were the responsibility of the County Committee.
- 8.4 The County Grounds' Accounts as presented were adopted on the proposal of M Harvey, seconded by S Donaghy.

9.0 Treasurer's Report

- 9.1 County Treasurer, Raymond McKeown, prepared and presented the Report of the Finance Committee and the County's Accounts for 2017; the Accounts were audited by and reported on by Cavanagh¦Kelly. The Treasurer reported that income, showed a 13% increase from the previous year, to £1,238,988 while expenditure rose by a similar percentage to £1,372,913 resulting in an operating deficit of £133,925 for the year.
- 9.2 The Balance sheet indicated Current Assets of £678,669 with Current Liabilities of £497,019 providing a Net Assets figure of £5,155,613 compared to the previous year's figure of £4,996,962.
- 9.4 There being no comment or queries on the Finance Report and the Accounts for 2017, they were adopted on the proposal of C McLaughlin which was seconded by S McCullagh.

10.0 Oraid an Chathaoirligh (2017) Roisin Ní Shuirtáin

Welcome to County Convention 2017 and I extend a warm welcome to the new club delegates who have not been with us before. It's hard to believe that we are nearing the end of another year

2017 has been a good year. Our seniors retained the McKenna Cup for the 6th year in a row. This competition gives players their chance to show their ability, skill and commitment to play senior football and although some may not get much game time throughout the year they are learning at all times what is required to make that break onto the main panel. Remaining in Div 1 of the National League means playing with the best and the strongest teams. Retaining the Anglo Celt Cup for a second year it is my belief that we are building stability and this can only be good for the future

A huge thank you to Feargal Logan for his leadership and commitment to our U21's over the last 4 years. Feargal is a quiet unassuming gentleman and was a pleasure to work with. I wish Feargal and his family well. Thank you also to Peter and Brian and the back room team for their energy and commitment.

Our Minors had a great run in the Ulster league campaign and went on to win it by beating Derry. It was unfortunate that they met again in the first round of the championship. While Tyrone had a good start in the first half, the second half showed a stronger Derry side, who went on to win the game.

However, I have no doubt that many of these young players will go on to be part of the U20 panel for 2018.

Thank you to Paul and Iggy for their work and commitment over the last 2 years and also thank you to their back room team.

I take this opportunity to congratulate Paul Devlin who has accepted the U20's managers role and I wish him good luck for 2018. Paul has named as part of his backroom team (a great addition)

CCC

I want to congratulate the CCC on an early completion of their programme of fixtures for 2017. With the decision of playing League and getting it down to playoffs before Championship worked really well and Even with the county getting to the All-Ireland semi-finals, all 3 championship winners were afforded the time to prepare for the first round of the Ulster Club. It does however put extra pressure on our gate people. We owe a great deal of gratitude to these people who leave their homes maybe two or three hours before the starting time to ensure all spectators can move through easy at all venues. Unfortunately one round of championship fixtures collided with the Ladies who were playing in the All-Ireland Final in Croke Park. I can't emphasis enough that a combined fixture plan for all codes must be prepared and presented to County Committee for ratification in March or before. This is the only way to insure that we can all play our games with no overlapping. Unfortunately due to the extremely heavy rain at times this year a small number of clubs suffered incredible damage to their facilities which rendered them unusable. A couple of the clubs set up a club draw to help with the cost of the remedial work. I congratulate them on their efforts.

2018 will be an interesting year for fixtures with the changes in month for playing U20's, backdoor for minors and the super 8's. One can only wait to see the outcome of the full season, both at County level and Club Level before we can really make judgement. I hope our fixture planners and the CCC work closely to provide a programme of fixtures that will work well for the clubs.

It remains a matter of legal consideration. Tyrone GAA must be united in going forward as one entity to advance the Tyrone cause. That remains my primary objective. I want to thank Aidy O'Kane and his legal team for all their help and support on this matter.

This year sees the retirements of Joe and Justin Mc Mahon and Captain Sean Cavanagh from our senior panel. 3 legends in their own right. The entertainment these men have given will live long in all our memories. All-Ireland winners and leaders both on and off the field and we thank them most sincerely for what they have contributed to Tyrone football.

Looking forward to 2018 Eunan eluded to it in his report. Tyrone GAA should follow Armagh's lead and set up TV so we can streamline some of our games. This is operated and run by Armagh GAA. In Tyrone this can also be done. Tyrone GAA will own it. The pay for viewing and all advertising must go through the County Office. Armagh TV is not long in operation and is already bringing in revenue. There will be set up costs but going forward the way the GAA is changing in promoting the game we need to move with the times. It is my belief that we have a great product and we should maximise all streams of Revenue for Tyrone GAA. Our company IT has registered a few Domain names on behalf of Tyrone GAA for Tyrone TV.

Also going forward 2018 all Management will take their place along the front of County Committee. The same as they sit tonight. (I'll finish with)

Dá measfaí a rathúla atá an Cumann sa chontae ar an méid trófaithe amháin a thóg na foirne ar an pháirc imeartha, bheadh 2018 ar cheann de na blianta ba bhoichte le deich mbliana anuas; bhí foirne peile agus iománaíochta an chontae san iomaíocht i ngach ceann de na comórtais oifigiúla i mbliana ach, cé gur imir siad roinnt cluichí ceannais, níor tugadh trófaí ar bith ar ais chuig an chontae. Is féidir rathúlacht agus dul chun cinn a mheas, áfach, ach réimse níos leithne critéar a úsáid, agus ós rud é gurb iomaí sin gné ag an Chumann, tig le Tír Eoghain bheith thar a bheith sásta lena bhfuil curtha i gcrích acu arís i mbliana.

I séasúr imeartha a bhí comhdhlúite amach is amach, d'imir foireann peile shinsearach Thír Eoghain dhá chluiche is fiche ó Mhí Eanáir ar aghaidh go dtí an chéad dheireadh seachtaine i Meán Fómhair, gan gníomhaíocht ar bith a bheith ann i Mí Aibreáin. D'fhan foireann an chontae i Rannóg 1 sa tSraith Náisiúnta Peile, bhí siad páirteach i gcluiche ceannais Chorn an Dr McKenna, buadh orthu sa chéad chluiche i gCraobh Uladh, rinne siad a mbealach trí chluichí cáilithe Chraobh na hÉireann, d'imir siad an chéad chluiche sa tsraith úrnua cheathrúcheannais Chraoibhe (ar a dtugtar an sárochtar), agus bhain siad Craobhchluiche na hÉireann amach den chéad uair le deich mbliana. Éacht mór.

Bhain foireann peile na mionúr na cluichí leathcheannais amach i Sraith agus i gCraobh Uladh araon, ach bhuaigh Muineachán agus Doire orthu faoi seach; d'ainneoin gur tugadh isteach formaid an chúldorais sa Chraobhchomórtas Cúige, ní raibh aon bhealach ar ais ag Tír Eoghain i mbliana.

Sa bhliain 2017 bhí áthas orainn é a chur ar an taifead gur bhain Cumann Naomh Pádraig an Táite Riabhach an Chraobh Shóisearach Peile agus iad ag ceiliúradh céad bliain ó cuireadh an Club ar bun. An uair sin, is beag duine a bheadh ábalta a rá nach fada eile go beadh mór-éacht suntasach déanta ag an chlub i mbliana tríd an Chraobh Idirmheánach a bhuachaint. Tréaslaímid leo siúd ar dá ngnóthaí é gur bhian siad go galánta dhá Chraobh i ndiadh a chéile agus guímid rath ar an chlub agus é ag dul i bhfiontar na gcomórtas sinsearach peile den chéad uair riamh.

Once again it is a privilege for me to present a Report on the affairs of the Association in this County during the past year.

If the measure of success for the Association in the County is solely the quantity of silverware acquired by its teams on the field of play, then 2018 would rank as one of the poorest in the last decade; Tyrone's football and hurling teams participated in all official competitions this year but, despite reaching several finals, there would be no trophies brought back to the county. However, success and progress can be measured using a wider range of criteria, and since there are so many facets to the Association, Tír Eoghain can be well-satisfied with its achievements this year, again.

In a highly condensed playing season the Tír Eoghain senior football team played twenty-two games from January through to the first weekend of September, with no activity taking place in April. The county team maintained its status in Division 1 of the National League, reached the Dr McKenna Cup final, lost its opening game in the Ulster championship, navigated its way through the All-Ireland qualifiers, played the first game in the newly-introduced All-Ireland quarterfinal series (known as the super eights), and reached the All-Ireland final for the first time in ten years. A fine achievement.



The Minor footballers reached the semifinals of both the Ulster league and the championship losing out to Muineachán and Doire, respectively; despite the introduction of a 'back-door' format in the provincial championship, there was no route back for Tír Eoghain this year.

In 2017 we were pleased to record a first-ever Junior football championship success for St Patrick's GAC Tattyreagh in the centenary year of its foundation and, at that time, very few could have foreseen the remarkable and outstanding achievement that the Club would make this year, by winning the Intermediate championship; we congratulate all concerned on these magnificent, consecutive championship successes and extend best wishes to the Club as it ventures into senior football competitions for the first time.

Congratulations is also due to other championship winners during the past year – Na Fianna Coalisland (Senior football), St Eugene's Newtownstewart (Junior football), Eoghain Ruadh Dungannon (Senior hurling) and Éire Óg Carrickmore (Junior hurling).

This year, once again, we pay tribute to Sean Hurson (Galbally Pearse's GAC) whose outstanding skills and expertise in refereeing continue to be recognised at national level, culminating in his appointment to take charge of the All-Ireland Minor football final between Ciarraí and Gaillimh. Sean is fully active on the domestic front also and this year he refereed a third Senior football championship final, following his previous successes in 2014 and 2016.

One of our fast-emerging hurling referees, Barry Winters, from the Eoghan Ruadh Club in Dungannon was also given deserved recognition by Ulster Council with his selection to take charge of its Intermediate hurling final between Keady (Armagh) and St Gall's (Antrim) last month.

On the administrative and planning front Tyrone launched its third Strategic Plan - 'Ag Ardú Níos Airde Aris na Laimhe Deirge ... Raising the Red Hand Even Higher' - in April, laying out its vision, aims and objectives for the next five years, 2018-22. Appreciation is due to the small Strategic Planning Committee for the delivery of this important Plan which will assist and guide all units of the Association in the county to develop a way ahead.

In another first for the Association within the county, a live internet streaming of a football game took place in September; Edendork and Galbally, participating in the Senior football championship quarterfinal at Healy Park, was viewed globally by over 700 contacts. This was followed by similar live streaming of the Junior final, then the Intermediate and Senior football finals, with an increased number of viewers and finally, the All-County League Division 1 final between Errigal Ciaran and St Enda's Omagh.

On the physical development front, Clubs do not stand still either and for this they must be highly commended; during 2018, development plans were initiated, grants were applied for and secured, and ongoing work was completed by others. One of the highlights of the year was the official opening of the Drumragh Sarsfield's excellent facilities at Clanabogan by Uachtarán na hÉireann, Michael D Higgins on 26th May.

Tír Eoghain continues to enjoy one of the highest levels of participation in Scór due, in the main, to the significant promotional and administrative work undertaken by the Language and Culture committee. It expects that all Clubs will make a major effort to be part of the jubilee celebrations in 2019, fifty years after the founding of Scór. This year, once again, an All-Ireland title came to the county when Dearbhla Scallon representing the St Patrick's GAC Gortin, won the Scór Sinsir title in Amhránaíocht Aonair (Solo Singing) in Sligo.

2. Senior Football

The 2018 season commenced with a new condensed-format Dr McKenna Cup competition played in the most testing of weather and ground conditions. Tír Eoghain arrived in the final having defeated Antrim, St Mary's College, Cavan and Fermanagh in a period of eleven days. The final against Donegal was deferred as a consequence of the adverse weather disruption until the first break in the NFL. In an entertaining game at the Athletic Grounds in Armagh, Donegal enjoyed success, winning the Cup by a margin of four points

The NFL got off to the worst possible start for Tír Eoghain with a four point defeat to Gaillimh in Tuam followed by a home reversal against reigning All-Ireland champions, Áth Cliath. The first pair of league points were secured in Newbridge in a closely-contested affair against Cill Dara while the losing margin in Castleblayney was a single point against Muineachán. There was a six-point victory over Dún na nGall in Omagh, and a winning margin of twelve points in Castlebar against Maigh Eo secured the county's place in Division 1 for another year. In the final game Tír Eoghain had six points to spare over Ciarraí, in Omagh. While there were many notable individual performances throughout this league campaign, a special mention is made of, and congratulations is extended to, Trillick's Lee Brennan who emerged as the top scorer in Division 1 of the National League with a total of two goals and thirty points.

In the first round of the Ulster Championship Tír Eoghain were drawn against Muineachán in Healy Park which attracted an attendance of 15,000 patrons. The home side started more brightly and led until additional time in the first half when a soft goal was conceded to leave the interval scoreline at 1-07 to 0-08. In the second period the visitors showed greater determination and urgency and had maintained their two-point lead when the final whistle sounded.

In Round 1 of the Qualifiers' series Tír Eoghain were drawn against An Mhí who had been eliminated from the Leinster championship by Longfort. Played in Navan, in excellent summer conditions, Tír Eoghain eased into an early lead and despite wasting a large number of scoring opportunities led by



only two points at the interval. The second half was a closely contested affair requiring an addedtime point for Tír Eoghain to stay in the championship. In extra time, Tír Eoghain started strongly and nervously defended a single-point lead through to the final whistle.

In Round 2 there was a lengthy trip to Dr Cullen Park in Carlow; Tír Eoghain absorbed considerable pressure in the opening quarter and held a three-point lead at the interval. In the second half they were a far superior side and ran out ten-point winners against Ceatharlach.

Tír Eoghain were drawn against An Cabhán, who had home advantage, in Round 3 of the Qualifier series; however, the CCCC made what can only be described as a bizarre decision to fix the game as curtain-raiser to Cill Dara and Maigh Eo in Croke Park. Following sustained objections from the Lily Whites — who were losing home advantage — the CCCC backed down and belatedly reversed its decision to rightfully allow Cill Dara to host Maigh Eo in Newbridge; the consequence for Tír Eoghain was that the match with An Cabhán was switched to Enniskillen, as nominated by Cavan. While the game never reached any great heights, Tír Eoghain led by four points at the interval, were hauled back to level scores midway through the second half, and finished more strongly to reach the final round of games.

In Round 4 Tír Eoghain faced the 'Rebel County' in a football championship game, for only the third time in our history, and never having tasted victory previously; the game took place in O'Moore Park Portlaoise on 7th July, on another brilliantly hot summer's evening. Tír Eoghain led by five points at the half-way stage and swept aside the Cork challenge in the second period to enjoy the easiest victory of the 2018 championship and to qualify for the All-Ireland quarter-finals' series.

In doing so, Tír Eoghain had the privilege of participating in the first-ever game in this series - which became known as the 'super eights' – against Ros Comáin in Croke Park. Leading by seven points at the interval, Tír Eoghain completely over-ran the westerner's for a comfortable victory on a scoreline of 4-24 to 2-12.

In the second quarter-final, the Leinster champions and current All-Ireland title holders – Áth Cliath – visited Healy Park. In an intense encounter, in front of a maximum capacity attendance, the visitors led by two points at the halfway stage and despite a stirring second half performance Tír Eoghain remained three points adrift when the final whistle sounded. While the performances of all players who participated was of an exceptionally high standard, it was disappointing that that of the referee did not match the occasion, but fell below his usual exceptionally high standards, and as displayed in the previous two games at which he officiated with Tír Eoghain in this year's championship. In the phase 3 quarterfinal Tír Eoghain made the short journey to Ballybofey to engage the newlycrowned Ulster champions, who had also lost to Áth Cliath and defeated Ros Comáin; Tír Eoghain dominated the opening third and the closing third of the game to register a memorable victory in a location where the home side had not lost a game since 2010. The Red Hands enjoyed a three-point lead after twenty minutes and had fallen behind by the same margin by half-time; Dún na nGall increased their lead to four points on the re-start and maintained it through the next twenty minutes. However, the substitutes were having an ever-increasing impact on the game as Tír Eoghain easing to victory by a margin of seven points, with thirteen different players registering on the scoresheet.

The All-Ireland semifinal was an all-Ulster affair with Muineachán providing the opposition in Croke Park; they had topped their quarterfinal group with victories over Cill Dara and Gaillimh and a draw against Munster champions, Ciarraí. Tír Eoghain commenced the game brightly going into an early three point lead but with wayward shooting becoming a problem the Farney county had drawn level by the break each having scored eight points. Going into the final quarter Monaghan briefly grabbed the lead, until a Niall Sludden goal changed the situation and Tír Eoghain kept ahead until the final whistle.

In a first final in ten years, Tír Eoghain came up against what is widely recognised as the best football team to have graced the pitches of Ireland, the reigning champions – Áth Cliath. The final was put back by a week from the initial schedule, in order to accommodate Pope Francis on his visit to Croke



Park as one of the highlights of the World Meeting of Families. The extra week was put to good use by the Tír Eoghain management who prepared diligently to ensure that, as many as possible, of the injured players became available for selection.

The Red Hands started off brightly, playing with confidence, and picking off simple scores in a regular fashion to lead by 0-05 to 0-01 after sixteen minutes; at this stage the reigning champions were visibly rattled. When a questionable penalty was awarded to, and converted by, the home side, followed by a couple of points as a result of errant kick-outs, the Dubs were ahead by two points; a second goal followed in the twenty-eighth minute and when the half-time whistle sounded Tír Eoghain had a huge seven-point deficit to overcome.

In the second half Tír Eoghain worked extremely hard, fought with great intensity, displayed resilience and bravery in defence but could not reduce the gap to less than four points due, in the main to some terrible choices, in their attempts to score points. Despite Tír Eoghain being awarded a penalty in the sixty-sixth minute, Áth Cliath finished the scoring with two points in the last of the seven minutes of additional time, and retained the Sam Maguire Cup for a fourth consecutive year on a scoreline of 2-17 to 1-14.

3.Minor (U17) Football

Tír Eoghain opened its Ulster league programme with an away defeat against Dún na nGall followed by a draw with Doire and then two victories over Aontroim and Fear Manach. This was sufficient to ensure qualification for the semifinal of the Jim McGuigan Cup against Muineachán; played in Inniskeen, the home side enjoyed an eight-point victory.

In the championship this year Ulster Council introduced a Qualifier format but also removed the competition from its traditional location in providing curtain-raiser games played with the senior football championship. In the first round played on Saturday 28th April, Tír Eoghain travelled to Ballybofey and came away with a comfortable victory over Dún na nGall. A place in the quarterfinal against an Dún in Newry was the reward and an eight-point victory was the outcome. The Ulster semifinal took place in Armagh on 1st July where the opponents were Doire; the concession of two goals at critical junctures in this game – one at the start of each half - left Tír Eoghain with an insurmountable challenge, and so Doire progressed to the final with a five-point lead.

4.U20 Football

The 2017 football championship at U20 level commenced with a home fixture against Muineachán on Friday 25th May. Tír Eoghain appeared to not realise the game had started as they conceded two goals and a point in the opening five minutes and at the end of the opening half there remained a five-point deficit. A strong second-half performance from a better drilled team saw Tír Eoghain wipe out the deficit and emerge as clear winners by a three-point margin. Semifinal opposition was provided by Ard Mhacha who had easily eliminated Fear Manach in the opening round; in an epic encounter that required two periods of extra time the teams were level on ten occasions, and while each county accumulated 24 scores during the course of the game, the home side had included two goals to give it a four-point victory. While players and management were devastated by this defeat it was highly disappointing that several players allowed themselves to be dragged into a general meleé in the last minute of such an exciting game, and regrettably, this may be the lasting memory of the fixture.

5. Hurling

Senior

The hurling season commenced in December 2017 with participation, for the first time, in the Conor McGurk Cup competition hosted by the Queen's University Belfast under the authority of Comhairle Uladh. In the two games played Tír Eoghain enjoyed success against the Ulster University and achieved a draw against Aontroim, but failed to qualify for the final of the competition on score difference.

The NHL commenced on 28th January with Warwickshire travelling to Dungannon where they were hosted in the Eoghan Ruadh Club's facilities. The visitors led from start to finish against a disappointing home side and won by five points. A second defeat followed in the Round 2 game away to an Lú and the first league points were acquired in an away victory over Muineachán. A first home win took place in Healy Park against Ros Comain and this was followed by a ten-point victory away to Longfort in the final league game. Tír Eoghain tied for second place with an Lú in the league but failed to participate in the final against Warwickshire, based on the result of the game against the 'wee county'.

Tír Eoghain commenced its campaign in the Nicky Rackard Cup competition at home to Dún na nGall. Played in Killyclogher they found the opposition — who had played their league hurling in a higher division - too difficult to handle, and suffered a fourteen point defeat. In their second game Tír Eoghain travelled to Carrick-on-Shannon, easing to an eleven-point victory against Liatroim and thereby qualifying for the competition's semifinal. Here, they met a Warwickshire side that had won



all three games in its group. While there was little between the two counties in the opening quarter, Warwickshire eased ahead after scoring a goal from a penalty, and at the finish were comfortable winners on a scoreline of 1-25 to 1-14.

6.The Inter-County Season

In 2018 there was a number of significant changes introduced to the senior football and hurling calendars in an attempt to enhance the quality of games and to create more available time slots for participation in Club games throughout the country.

As some of these changes have been introduced on a three-year experimental basis it is only proper that their success, or otherwise, should not be judged until the end of the trial period when all counties have had the opportunity to experience all of their effects. Based on this county's specific experience at senior football level in 2018, having participated in four competitions — Dr McKenna Cup, National League, Ulster Championship and All-Ireland championship - we would make the following observations.

The length of the playing season, although shortened by two weeks, is still considered to be extensive, with the first official fixture taking place on 3rd January and the final game being on 2nd September (while noting that there were no inter-county fixtures in April).



Fixtures were condensed into very short time-frames – 4 McKenna Cup games were played in 11 days; 12 McKenna Cup and NFL games took place in a period of just under 13 weeks; and, Tyrone participated in 9 All-Ireland championship games in a 12-week period. It can be noted that if the senior football team had been less successful in the McKenna Cup, the All-Ireland Qualifier series and the All-Ireland quarterfinal series, and more successful in the Ulster Championship, these statistics regarding numbers of games would have been somewhat different, and the timeframes would have reduced considerably.

Condensed periods of large sequences of fixtures has an impact on players, in relation to recovery from the demands of games and injuries that are sustained which could lead to a demand for an increase in players' panel sizes. There is also an impact on the management and the coaching / training personnel working in a voluntary capacity with teams, as well as the administrative aspects associated with weekly inter-county fixtures; in addition there is a significant financial impact on patrons and supporters who wish to be in attendance at all of their county's fixtures; and finally, there is an adverse impact with the demands placed on the inter-county referees, some of whom seem to get very few breaks, and some of whom end up officiating with the same counties with too much regularity, although the simple solution to this issue would be to increase the size of the intercounty panel.

In 2018 Tyrone's senior footballers played 22 games in a season of 7 months; the Club players in the County play a minimum of 16 matches in league and championship (and up to 3/4 more games in a successful championship) in a 7-month period, commencing in April. A 'county player' with a successful Club could have participated in 41 games in a 10-month period; this demanding schedule continues to be avoided due to the goodwill and co-operation of all Clubs in their acceptance of the need for so-called 'starred' league games. This acceptance often results in Club teams not achieving their potential success — in winning leagues, gaining promotion, or avoiding relegation — in a given year.

On a trial basis, consideration should be given to commencing the inter-county season with the National League, followed by a stand-alone Provincial Championship, in which more than one game takes place on each weekend; then, an All-Ireland two-tier championship, with 16 teams in each tier, would conclude the inter-county season. The grading of teams for each tier of the championship would best be determined on finishing positions in the previous year's National League, with all Division 1 and Division 2 teams participating in the higher tier and all the Division 3 and Division 4 teams taking part in the lower tier championship. This set-up would bear a strong resemblance to that which operates very effectively at Club level in most counties; it would result in county teams participating in games that are much more meaningful and competitive — which is fairer to the stronger counties as well as to the weaker ones - and players competing against opponents of a similar strength and quality. With a two-tier All-Ireland championship, supporters and patrons would be attracted to attend games in greater numbers where the outcomes are not predictable, or foregone conclusions. The timeframes would remain condensed but the number of games to be scheduled within the allocated timeframes would be reduced, with the possibility of Club games being accommodated more readily, also.



7.Club Competitions

The first Club activity of 2018 was an Intermediate All-Ireland football semifinal for the Moy Tír na nÓg; the Tyrone and Ulster champions took on and defeated Munster representatives An Ghaeltacht from Kerry, in Semple stadium Thurles on 27th January. The game had been postponed for a week due to an unplayable pitch in Portlaoise and while it never rose to any great heights, the Moy came from three points behind in added time to win by two points.

A week later they played in the All-Ireland final against Michael Glavey's from Roscommon, who also had a two-point victory in their semifinal against Kilanerin-Ballyfad from Wexford. On this occasion Moy totally controlled the opening half, to lead by seven points at the break, and while the second half was a more evenly contested affair, their superiority was never in doubt. At the finish Moy were crowned All-Ireland Intermediate champions in Croke Park on a scoreline of 1-10 to 0-07; a magnificent and historic achievement.

Congratulations to Moy – its players, management, and Club officers - on their outstanding and successful championship campaigns in Tyrone, Ulster and at All-Ireland level through 2017 and 2018.

On the domestic front, official competitions commenced with the U21 football league, originally listed for 20th January, but deferred for a week due to adverse winter weather. This new slot at the beginning of the calendar was a further attempt by the CCC, in co-operation with Clubs, to provide a meaningful competition in an improved programme of games.

Adult football began in customary fashion with the All-County League on Saturday 31st March with the ordinary rounds completed by Sunday 28th October, and the month of November used to conclude the promotion and relegation issues in all three divisions. By the end of April all Clubs had played five games with their 'county players' being available; leagues were able to continue without disruption, using the 'starred' games protocol agreed between the Clubs and the Competitions Control Committee (CCC) at the start of the season, up until the first week-end in July at which time twelve rounds of fixtures had taken place. The so-called holiday period and the participation of the county team in the All-Ireland Qualifier series and Quarter-finals' series prevented the final three rounds of games being fixed.

For this excellent programme of regular games having taken place as planned, appreciation is due to the officers of the CCC and the Clubs that have shown so much co-operation and goodwill; the outcome brings benefits to all Clubs and their players.

The area that continues to be of major concern is the reserve football competition, and in particular, the large number of Clubs that do not, or cannot, fulfil league fixtures in the latter months of the season. While it is recognised that there is a range of reasons for teams not fielding, there must be serious consideration given to finding a solution or a combination of solutions; perhaps there needs to be options within reserve football: (i) competitive fixtures, or, (ii) social games. Clubs or teams could then decide which category to opt for, depending on which is most suitable for their needs, and taking account of their available player resources. To not seek solutions, is not an option.





Tyrone Junior Football Champions 2018 - St Eugene's Newtownstewart

At Junior level, in 2018, St Eugene's GAC Newtownstewart won its fourth championship with a fully-deserved two-point victory over the Red Knights GAC Beragh in the final at Healy Park on 7th October. On their way to collecting the newly-named Pat Darcy Cup, Newtownstewart had victories over Brocagh, Castlederg and Clogher in the semifinal.

In the Intermediate championship St Patrick's GAC Tattyreagh - the 2017 Junior champions — reached the final where they came up against St Macartan's GAC Augher. On their way to the final, Augher overcame Loughmacrory, Owen Roes and Stewartstown while Tattyreagh were victorious against Urney, Dungannon and Gortin. Played in Healy Park on 21st October, Augher had a bright start and led by four points after fifteen minutes only for the sides to draw level at the break. In the second period there was little between the two team but, in their now characteristic fashion, Tattyreagh finished very strongly, and with a three-point lead, were crowned Intermediate champions for 2018. This was a remarkable and historic occasion for the St Patrick's Club which won the Junior Cup for the first time only twelve months ago and now find themselves moving into senior football in 2019, for the first time in the Club's existence.

The Senior championship final was a repeat of that of 2016 between St Mary's GAC Killyclogher and Na Fianna Coalisland, which was won by the former following a replay. In reaching this year's final Coalisland accounted for Dromore, Errigal Ciaran and Edendork while Killyclogher dealt successfully



with the challenges of Derrylaughan, Omagh and Ardboe. In the opening half, Na Fianna could not score from play but were only two adrift at the interval; on the re-start two goals in the space of four minutes transformed a three-point deficit into a three-point lead. Despite its best and valiant efforts the St Mary's side could not match the desire and effectiveness of Coalisland as they deservedly won their first senior championship since 2010 and their tenth overall.

In the Ulster championship Newtownstewart got off to an outstanding start and opened up a six-point lead in the opening stages of its quarter-final against Emyvale; by half-time the lead was reduced to two, and in the second half the Monaghan Junior champions proved far superior and eventually won the game by nine points.

At Intermediate level, Tattyreagh were drawn against Armagh champions, St Peter's Lurgan with the Athletic Grounds as the venue. In a thrilling encounter the Tyrone representatives enjoyed a five-point lead by half-time, but had to withstand a strong fightback, including a last-minute penalty, to emerge as winners by a single point. Next up in the Ulster semifinal was Antrim champions St Enda's Glengormley who had defeated Doohamlet (Monaghan) in their opener. In a closely contested first half the city side edged into a two point lead which was quickly clawed back after the re-start; Tattyreagh went ahead with a quickly taken goal but failed to add to their advantage allowing St Enda's to score the final four points and progress to the Ulster final with two points to spare.

The County's senior football representatives also travelled to Armagh to take on their new champions, Crossmaglen Rangers; in a somewhat low-scoring game, where the sides were level on seven occasions, Na Fianna found themselves down by one point at the break due, in the main, to



poor shooting. Despite going ahead in the second period, they eventually lost out by two points – final score 0-12 to 0-10.

Three teams participated in the Tyrone adult hurling championship in 2018; in the one senior semifinal that took place, Éire Óg enjoyed a thirty-one point victory over Naomh Colum Cille and thereby qualified for the final against traditional rivals Eoghan Ruadh. In a much more closely-contested affair, the Dungannon side emerged victorious with a winning scoreline of 1-15 to 2-10, bringing their senior championship tally to twenty-four.

In the Junior championship final the Carrickmore B team defeated Naomh Colum Cille, again, with a four-point winning margin.

Despite the determined efforts of a small number of individuals, and a smaller number of Clubs, hurling competition within the County remains in a very poor state; this is mostly borne out by the fact that, across all youth grades and at adult level, Clubs are unable to field teams and in some competitions there are more matches conceded than played. All Clubs involved in hurling indicate that there is a lack of numbers of players, there is a lack of interest among players, and there is a drop out of the players that should be coming through from youth to adult level. While finance is of critical importance in the management and existence of all Clubs, there is no indication that lack of finance is a contributory factor to this poor state of hurling competition.

One question that is always posed is whether the level of interest among young people would increase if there was even more coaching made available in the Clubs or provided in the schools. While it is impossible to give a definitive answer, without actually experimenting with greater levels of coaching, the evidence gleaned over the last decade or so does not encourage travelling in this direction. There has been a significant investment by Clubs and by the County, both in coaching personnel and coaching finances, during at least ten years and the situation shows very little improvement and more usually some deterioration. The formation of three new hurling Clubs two years ago was a most welcome development that grew out of the five year strategy devised by the Hurling Development Committee. It is hoped that the initial enthusiasm which was evident in their catchment areas remains intact so that the young players stay together, as teams, up to adult levels.

8. Players' Injury Benefit Fund

In March 2018 the Players' Injury Fund transferred completely to an online system for the registration and processing of players' claims; its ease of use ensured that the Club officers responsible for the administration of claims adapted readily to the changes introduced by Willis Towers Watson.

In the current year there was a total of 262 injury claims registered of which just over 50% (136) were successfully completed or partially processed by the end of the financial year. Subscriptions to the Benefit Fund by Tyrone GAA − Clubs and County - amounted to €245,412.32 covering a total of 509 adult and youth teams. Funds drawn down by players to compensate for injury investigations and treatments and loss of earnings were comparable to those of 2017, totalling €359,191.54.

In the general administration of injury claims there remains a few requirements that a small number of Clubs are still failing to comply with: (i) an injury claim must be submitted / registered online within sixty days of occurrence of the injury, (ii) a claimant must be registered as a Club member at the time when the injury occurs, and (iii) the injured player's team must be registered with the Benefit Fund at the time when the injury occurs. Failure to comply with all three of these conditions will result in the injury claim being rejected; simply put, all players should be registered as Club members, and their teams registered with the Injury Fund, before the commencement of the season's training.

9. Schools & Colleges

The promotion of Gaelic games in Tyrone's schools and colleges has been maintained at an exceptionally high level, through the outstanding work undertaken by their teachers and other staff and supported by the presence of coaches employed by Ulster Council and the County Committee. It is a matter of great concern that the coaches who are involved with the Keystage 1 children in the Primary Schools are having their contracts terminated due to a lack of funding from the Department of Education to the Ulster Council. We are gratefully appreciative of all the work being done by the teachers and the coaches in the schools promoting Gaelic games and for their participation in the schools' and colleges' competitions.

I pay tribute to hurling coach, Aidan Kelly, in particular, for his initiative in organising and managing a panel of schoolchildren to represent the county in the Casement Cup competition this year, and I congratulate him on the remarkable, but merited victories in winning the competition in the first year of participation.

Congratulations goes to all schools that enjoyed success on the playing field in the 2018 academic year:

- St Joseph's Donaghmore, winners of the McDevitt Cup, by defeating Sacred Heart Omagh in the final and also, Irish News Cup winners with a final victory over neighbouring St Ciaran' Ballygawley.
- Holy Cross Strabane who won the McAvoy Cup in a thrilling final against Lismore Craigavon
- The Dean Maguirc Carrickmore defeated Loreto Coleraine to win the Paddy O'Hara Cup on a scoreline of 7-11 to 0-11
- Holy Trinity Cookstown who achieved the greatest success; in the semifinal of the McLarnon Cup they had five goals to spare over Our Lady & St Patrick's Knock, which was a major contrast with the final. It ended all square after extra time, and following extra time in the replay, the Cookstown college emerged as winners by a margin of a single point – a first ever McLarnon title.

In the All-Ireland semifinal there was a comfortable victory in Abbotstown against Pobalscoil Inbhear Sceine from Kenmare after a most remarkable opening quarter when the Tyrone champions fell behind by ten points.

Then in the All-Ireland Final, on 07/04/18 in Croke Park, Holy Trinity defeated St Nathy's College Ballaghaderreen (Mayo) 0-19 to1-06 to bring home the Paddy Drummond Cup.

10.Sponsorship

In the lead-up to our participation in the All-Ireland football final and in respect of the post-match banquet there were many goodwill offers of support and donations from small businesses and individuals in addition to those made available from our leading brand partners. For all of these, we are most grateful and in return we would urge all our Clubs and patrons who can do so, to support those who have supported us.

11.All-Ireland Final Matters

The major achievement of the senior football team reaching another All-Ireland final, by way of a ten-game sequence over a period of fifteen weeks, has been referred to earlier in this report with respect to its effects on Club activity and impact on players.

There is also a fairly major effect on Clubs' officers, administrators at all levels in the Association, and of course supporters and patrons when a County enjoys, or endures, a series of ten championship games in such a condensed period of time.

For the supporters and patrons who follow the team, there is a significantly high financial cost including that of, (i) admission tickets, (ii) hotel accommodation and meals, and, (iii) travel. Taking into account that, this year, Tyrone had two games at home, three games in Croke Park and five games at venues ranging from Enniskillen to Carlow, it is easy to see how the financial outlay mounts up; when these costs are accumulated within a short timeframe families can certainly experience financial strain.

One of the biggest impacts on Club Officers' and administrators' workloads is that of the management of the provision of match tickets for the general membership. While the introduction of the 'season ticket' a number of years ago, and the general availability of match tickets online and via Centra and SuperValu shopping stores, has eased the demands of the general public, a Club's members still expect to be able to source their tickets from the Club. This means that the Club officer with responsibility for tickets, must accept and collate the members' requests, place the order with County office, collect the tickets when they become available and make payment, allocate and distribute the tickets to the members, accept payments and record the transaction details. All of these tasks can be readily managed for a one-off game, and where there is no limit on the availability of tickets, and where members do not make late requests, but, when these circumstances change and games are arising on a weekly basis, the situation becomes very difficult. In 2018 we were most fortunate that for almost all of the championship games in which Tyrone participated there was good availability of tickets; there will always be limited availability for an All-Ireland final, but even for this year's final we are confident that every genuine supporter or patron was accommodated with a ticket. The only cause for complaint arose for the All-Ireland quarter-final fixture in Ballybofey when only 1600 tickets were available through the County's ticketing system; while season tickets (approx. 1100) were allocated directly to their holders, it was most



disappointing to only receive a ten per cent allocation of the official capacity of the stadium, when only two counties were participating.

At county level I pay tribute to the work done throughout the 'ticket season' by members of staff, particularly Anne Marie who was always in the front line, and to a fine group of volunteers who gave so willingly of their valuable time, including Eileen Connolly, Roisin Jordan and Sarahjane Kelly; in thanking all of these I make special mention of Frank Campbell this year, yet again, for his outstanding assistance, through long hours, working on tickets and without whose help it would not have been possible to meet the distribution deadlines.

I also wish to acknowledge the support and assistance readily made available by the staff of the ticket office in Croke Park under the management of Emma Tormey, and thank them for it. Another group of people to whom we owe a deep debt of gratitude were those who organised and managed the All-Ireland final post-match banquet and the players' homecoming to Aughnacloy and Healy Park. For all of their work and their other contributions we thank the person who oversaw it all, Michael Kerr, together with Eileen Connolly, Anne Marie McNuty, Michelle Cox, Cuthbert Donnelly, Raymond McKeown, Michael McCarney, Oliver McHugh and the officers of St Enda's GAC Omagh and O'Neill's GAC Aghaloo. Finally, we acknowledge the support provided over the All-Ireland final weekend from the Mid-Ulster and Fermanagh Omagh District Councils, and the emergency services including the PSNI and the Gárda Síochana, and thank all of these bodies for their assistance.

12.Buíochas

At the outset I express sincere thanks to the Officers of all Clubs in Tyrone for their co-operation and assistance throughout another busy year, including a very hectic summer with much time taken up with the processing of tickets for inter-county fixtures. A special word of thanks to the Treasurers and Secretaries for all of this work. I also pay tribute to his predecessor, Roisin Jordan, the first female county chairperson in the Association's history when elected in 2015, for her work and contribution to the management of Tyrone GAA during her three-year term of office.

This year again, I offer deepest gratitude to Cisteoir Raymond McKeown for the financial governance that he brings to the County's affairs, through his expertise and professional approach; I acknowledge his advice, guidance and assistance on many issues and thank him for the work he undertakes, and the time he devotes to the overseeing of Tyrone GAA's finances.

The five-year rule for membership of the Management Committee brings about the departure of Eileen Connolly, from the role of Vice-treasurer at this year's Convention. I thank Eileen for the onerous and time-consuming workload that she has undertaken in this position, assisting in the management and control of all matters of finance, on a daily basis. Her detailed consideration of



existing practices and enthusiastic approach towards innovative procedures are fully acknowledged and admired.

Tony McKenna



In July 2018 the GAA in Tyrone, and further afield, learned with deep sadness of the death of former County Chairman, Tony McKenna. Tony was a member of the Éire Óg GAC in Clogher and remained so even when he attended second-level school in St Macartan's College Monaghan, when he emigrated to Canada and when he returned and set up home in Killyclogher.

As a player he was a member of the last team from the St Macartan's College to win the MacRory Cup in 1956, and he always maintained strong links with the Monaghan school.

Before departing for Canada he linked up with the Tyrone senior football panel that would go on to achieve the county's historic first

Ulster championship in 1956. And, upon his return to Tyrone Tony became involved in all aspects of the Association, as a referee, a team manager and later as a top administrator.

In 1982 he became Chairman of the County's Activities' Board (a fore-runner of the CCC) and provided appropriate leadership and direction here until 1989; at the same time, he was elected County Chairman (1987) where he served for the then customary three-year period. Tony gave a lot of time to both posts, always keen to make improvements and devoting considerable thought to innovative ideas; one that he is well-remembered for was the introduction of Disciplinary Leagues, which were used to identify the best performing (and poorest) teams, in terms of their behaviour and conduct during official competitive fixtures; disciplinary tables were published on a monthly basis during the playing season, and at year's end the top teams in each adult league were presented with their much-coveted Disciplinary Awards.

Tony remained a life-long supporter of the county's football teams and was always in attendance at games – irrespective of the location, including this year's All-Ireland Qualifier series. His support was also evidenced by his membership of the Club Tyrone and he was of course a Garvaghey Patron.



On behalf of Tyrone GAA our deepest sympathy is extended to Tony's wife Sheila, his two sons Eoghan and Niall, his wide family circle and to his Club, Éire Óg.



Club Developments

The Committee assisted and continue to assist Clubs that were planning or had started major projects of various disciplines. Clubs including Kildress, Moortown, Augher, Dungannon, Killeeshil had meetings with us throughout the year. It is very important that Clubs contact the Development Officer in the County first. It makes the process somewhat easier than contacting Ulster or Croke Park in the first instance.

Club Development Plans

Moy, Drumragh and Killyclogher volunteered in early Spring of 2017 to join a Pilot Scheme of 30 Clubs across Ireland to rollout a new Development Plan format. Disappointingly nothing at all happened until quite recently when Ciaran McLaughlin was appointed Chairperson of a new Club Planning Committee in Croke Park. Since Ciaran's appointment the three Clubs and four other Tyrone Clubs who had contacted me earlier in the year have had notification on things progressing. Drumquin went ahead with their Development Plan, my thanks to Sarahjane Kelly for facilitating the proceedings.

Club Officer Training and Club Officer Workshops

19 Tyrone Clubs attended the above sessions which are organised by Ulster and were held in Letterkenny and Magherafelt in January. I would be hoping that in 2019 we will be hosting them in Tyrone. On the 17th of October our Committee in conjunction with the Ulster Finance Committee held workshops on Pre-AGM and Financial Governance. 50 delegates representing 24 Clubs were in attendance. Many thanks to Seamus Woods, Gerard Bradley and Ciaran McLaughlin for delivering these.

GAA Grant Workshop

On June 20th in Garvaghey our Committee held a successful Workshop on the GAA Grants process. 43 delegates from 30 Clubs were in attendance. Also, on the night advice was given on dealing with banks, and a presentation was given on the procedures and protocols for Clubs hosting championship matches. There was advice and guidance given on the National Anthem and match day announcements. This proved to be a very successful evening resulting in a 75% increase in the number of Verti-Draining applications and a 125% increase in Capital Grant applications. It is important to note that Clubs can claim from the GAA retrospectively for capital works completed within 5 years. Many thanks to Paul Sanders (Ulster), Gerard Bradley, Paul Maxwell, Michael McCarney and Donal Magee for their huge contributions on the night.

Elevate Awards

Congratulations to Stewartstown and Newtownstewart who successfully completed this course run by the Ulster Council. The aim of the programme is to offer Clubs a higher level of expertise across a range of different areas.

Contingency Plan for Dealing with Ground Emergencies

This document was presented by our Committee and subsequently adopted at the May meeting of the County Committee. It was drawn up as a result of 3 Clubs getting severely damaged by the August 2017 Floods. Many thanks to Sarahjane Kelly and Orla Kelly for putting a huge amount of effort into writing up the document and to Paul Maxwell for leaving it ready for adoption. This document will be reviewed annually and amended if necessary.



New Development Officer Role

As decided at Congress at the beginning of the year, the County Development Officer will now be appointed rather than elected. The new role is to focus solely on Club Officer training and Club planning; we as a County have ensured that assistance with the Physical Development of Clubs will not be compromised.

Club Visits

It was our intention to visit each Club during the year but with the tri-annual Ulster Council visits in October we decided to leave them until early 2019. Notification will be given in good time, but it will be our intention to spend a bit of time with our Clubs and see if there is any assistance that we can give. It will also be an opportunity to share all the positive work that is going on around the County.

Conclusion

It was an honour and privilege to serve as County Development Officer for 2018. My thanks to the members of the Planning and Physical Development Committee, Michael, Gerard, Paul, Petesey and Rory for their knowledge, assistance, willingness and desire to make a difference. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank Dominic and the staff of Garvaghey, Anne-Marie, Roisin and Gregory for the countless times they have assisted and helped me throughout the year. On a personal level I am indebted to Gerard Bradley for all the guidance he has given to me. From the day I took office at convention last year Gerard has been immense. I can't speak highly enough of Gerard and very much appreciate everything that he has done for me.

The Tyrone Communications Sub Committee 2018

During my first year as County PRO, I would have to start by acknowledging my genuine appreciation for the huge demands and high expectations required to fulfil the role. I am now fully aware of just how important the entire facet of Communications and PR & Marketing is to a County like Tyrone. Starting out away back in December my first priority was to assemble a Communications team around me to help me share the workload. I was very lucky to be able to call on a bunch of committed Gaels who were very much bought into good Communications and also prepared to put their shoulder to the Wheel. This support was a fantastic boost to me as I attempted to get to grips with all the many demands aligned to the PRO role and responsibilities. The starting point in order to get the show on the road was to draw up an Action Plan to determine our focus for the year and to set the targets around our desired Goals for 2018.

Tyrone GAA 2018: Communications Sub-Committee Work Plan



The main targets for the Sub-Committee in 2018 were to:

- Enhance the Red Hand View Match Programme (Introduce new additions to content)
- Promote and Support the introduction of Live Streaming of our games within Tyrone
- Increase Match Day Programme sales by 10%.
- Introduce Red Hand View Programme Sellers Bibs.
- Replace Programme Sellers Signage for match day at Sellers tables.
- Organise a Club PRO's Seminar on the Role of a PRO.
- Explore methods and ways to improve Communications through use of Social Media
- Organise a Promotion Launch event on Tyrone Club Championships.
- Raise profile of Communications Committee through regular Podcasts.
- Enhance Club Championship programmes
- Create better co-operation amongst other Codes Ladies/Camogie/ Hurling/Handball/Rounders/Scór
- Create Press/Media overflow area in the main stand in Healy Park

The Work-Plan helps show how we will assist Communications to take forward some of the Actions contained within Tyrone GAA's approved five-year strategic plan "Ag Ardú Níos Airde na Laimhe Deirge ... Raising the Red Hand Higher". The work-plan for 2018 I am glad to report achieved all main targets as listed and helped promote as many of the aspects associated the "Raising the Red Hand Higher". Setting our stall out meant creating a New Brand and a clear Identity for Tyrone Communications. To enable this to happen a completely new Communications Backdrop was designed and manufactured thanks to Kieran Kennedy in O'Neill's. The Backdrop became the focal point for all Communications events and meetings. This helped raise the profile associated with the Communications Committee and presented a very professional image.

In almost every concept be it in a Work or Business Environment Sport is no different, Communications is a vital component. Good Communications is the life blood of any organisation. I am confident in saying that during 2018 our focus to maintain an improving performance regarding how we go about our Communications was very much to the fore in all we did.

In today's society how we communicate is on every agenda. There are so many demands associated with Communications and PR. It has almost become a full time role such are the constant pressures placed on requiring a response or an update immediately. The variety of clients both members, supporters as well as the many external individuals and organisations including the Press & Media all requesting information, updates or explanations on a daily basis can no longer be fobbed off or put on the long finger. The overwhelming success story associated with nearly every Gaelic Football Club or County team means they are constantly in the spotlight there is always a storyline or a reaction requiring attention. The appetite to keep the wide audience up to speed is almost beyond satisfying.

Social Media: One of the ever increasing workloads associated to the role of Communications and that of the PRO is to maintain the latest craze in getting the message out by the use of various forms aligned to Social Media. The current generation of not just our GAA members but virtually all the many other followers, is the use of Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, and Linkedin as well as Youtube plus Snapchat. These avenues to communicating and getting our message across is now equally as important and the demands to keep the frenzied expectation to know what is happening and when it is happening grows more and more each day. This modern vehicles of communications requires almost an immediate response or reaction. In order to do so you are almost on standby for the greater part of everyday thus placing additional responsibility to fulfil the role of a County PRO.



Looking back on a busy and eventful year there were many highlights none more so than in my first year as County PRO, Tyrone reaching a Senior All Ireland Football Final. The Buzz and the excitement surrounding the build up to the final never mind the sheer thrill of being a part of the magic of Croke Park on All Ireland Final day will last long in my memory. It is every players dream to play and be a part of the whole experience of All Ireland Final Day for me as County PRO it was no different. The pride I felt at being a small part of the occasion on the first Sunday in September will be hard to match and made all the headaches and strains endured throughout the course of the year more bearable.

Website/Facebook/Twitter: Tyrone's GAA website once again continues to have one of the most visited number of viewing figures and has grown continually over the course of the year. With almost 300,000 visitors monthly, the Website is on course to hit an annual viewing visitor's figure of 2.8 million visits. Well up on the same figures for the previous 12 months of 1.49 million visitors. An overall 52% increase.

The Facebook account has an Audience heading towards 34,000 followers which is almost an increase of 4,000 from this time last year. As for Twitter again, the Account has proved a huge success with now almost 56,000 followers, a massive increase of nearly 6,000 over the last 12 months. Our Twitter live updates from the various matches covered has shown from the available figures a consistently high viewing audience. These facts and figures prove beyond doubt the popularity of our Social Media Platforms and we must continue the growth in attracting new followers and getting our messages and updates to an even wider audience.

Red Hand View Match Programmes: Part and Parcel of the PRO's role is to ensure there are Match Day Programmes produced for all the Allianz National League games in both Football and Hurling. In 2018 after many years working alongside our Design team and publishers under the watchful eye of Niall Laird and L2 Design we have moved the production and design of the Red Hand View to North West News Group. I wish to place on record my sincere thanks and gratitude to Niall, Kate and Chris for all their help and support shown to me in the early stages after taking up the County PRO role. Niall was a true gentleman offloading his expert advice and guidance to steer me in the right direction during my early days.

Over the course of the season we managed to produce a rebranded new version of the Red Hand View Match Day Programme experience. The lay out and content was changed to incorporate a series of new features which hopefully helped reach out to an even wider audience. The introduction of the Golden Ticket Winner provided for one lucky supporter who purchased a programme and who found the Golden Ticket the award of an O'Neill's Voucher for the County Jersey of their choice. Added to this the Kids Section and the Photo Quiz allowed the winner to collect an O'Neill's Voucher for the County Jersey of their choice, both these additions have proved very popular and have been welcomed by the supporters.

On top of these, other new features included "The minute with a Tyrone Player" as well as The Special Article on the Club also back in the programmes is "The Valuing the Volunteer Interview". Once again great efforts were made to ensure all the other important aspects common to our Red Hand View programme experience were still in place, (ie) the coverage of all the Gaelic Codes, including Culture & Scór as well as Hurling, Handball, Camogie, plus Ladies Football and Rounders equally received the prominence they deserved.

To assist in sales and promotion I took the decision to introduce specially made Tyrone Communications Programme Sellers Bibs to clearly identify our match day programme sellers. The



provision of new clearly identifiable Programme Sellers tables at various areas within the grounds at Healy Park made it much easier experience to purchase a programme. In the lead up to all the big match days another first for the Communications Committee was the use of our very own Red Hand View Pod Cast. This build up interview outlined the Programme information content plus many other interesting snip bits of additional facts and figures proved extremely popular. It is only right and proper to offer my sincere thanks to Declan Mc Girr and his team of programme sellers who helped on match days also Kieran Kennedy from O'Neill for his kind sponsorship and support shown to myself and the Communications Team throughout the year.

The Single page match day programmes produced for all our internal youth finals as well as all the adult Club Championship games were again well received. In total almost 50 match programmes were published and this year the element of Colour was implemented into the layout with Club Crests as well as info on the team captains and team managements. Also included for a first is the Referee details along with his umpires. To allow all this to happen a massive debt of gratitude must go to all the members of the Communications Committee as well as Rory Cox and Anne Marie for their valued input and despite some tight deadlines and turnarounds the programmes were produced. Going forward I would hope we can explore the possibility of designing an Ap which you will be able to log onto and be able to pick up the actual match day programme for all our internal Club Championship games as well as Youth Finals. This will make it more accessible to our supporters from the touch of a button.

County Final Programmes: As stated earlier over the last number of years the show case events in terms of publications have always tremendous centred on the Programmes for our Senior plus Intermediate and Junior Football Finals as well as our Senior and Junior Hurling Finals. This year after many successful publications by Laird Design we moved to a new design team and publishers and thankfully all three productions, a 16 pages programme for the Senior Hurling Final plus a 36 pages edition for the Junior Championship & U.16 Gr.1 League finals plus a bumper 60 pages production for the Intermediate and Senior Football finals received huge praise from all concerned. I wish to acknowledge the help provided by Cathal Mc Erlean (Vector Design) who published the Hurling final programme and to North West News Group with designer Eugene Duffy for all their patience and support in helping to produce the Senior and Intermediate County Final programme. I must also mention the efforts from all our many contributors especially Paddy Hunter, Aodhan Harkin, Francie Mooney and Mark Conway. Their commitment was over and beyond what could be expected. I am indebted to them for all their hard work. The new A5 programme size has been warmly welcomed by all the supporters and Media alike. It is now seen as a more user friendly size for our supporters.

The Print Media: Alongside all the internal Communications and publications undertaken by the Communications Committee the coverage supplied by all our Print Media both within the County and much further afield has been phenomenal and thus ensures that all aspects of Gaelic games within the County is given coverage second to none. We are very lucky to have such ardent scribes with a dedicated interest in Gaelic Games and their promotion ensures the profile of our games reaches far and wide.

I personally wish to thank a wide range of various Editors and Journalists who work hard to promote our games and offer great support to me as County PRO, namely Dominic Mc Clements, Barry O'Donnell, Ronan Scott plus Francie Mooney, Kevin Kelly, Alan Rodgers, Niall Gartland, Ronan Mc Sherry, Niall Mc Coy, Damien Donnelly, Paddy Hunter as well as Declan Bogue, John Campbell, Brendan Crossan, Cahir O'Kane plus Andy Watters, Kenny Archer, Thomas Hawkins, Neill Loughran, Orla Bannon, plus I am sure there may be others I have overlooked. I greatly appreciate the help and



support shown to me over the course of the year. A special mention to Thomas Hawkins for his efforts to include Tyrone fixtures every Tuesday morning.

To cater for the larger influx of Press/Media on Big Championship or Super 8's match days we needed additional space and this year we introduced 20 extra Press Stations with a fixed bench and access to both electric and broadband provision in the main stand at Healy Park.

Radio & TV: Once more the service which is provided by both the Local and National Broadcasting providers I must rightly acknowledge their efforts to ensure coverage of our games. Communications is the life blood of any organisation and again I wish to call upon both TV and Radio stations to cater properly for the many GAA events including games, so they receive as much publicity as possible. There is no doubt there can always be room for improvement and I would impress on those in authority to demand equality when it comes to coverage of Gaelic games. I would impress upon both BBC & UTV to further expand their coverage of Gaelic games or they could soon see themselves left behind with the provision and expansion by many Counties to introduce their own coverage via Live streaming and their own GAA TV. The demand and popularity of Gaelic games is beyond doubt and now is the time to act.

Photography: During my first year one major blessing has been the co-operation shown by our gallant band of Photographers within the County. I have been very lucky to have had access to photo's being provided by a dedicated team of Men and women behind the lens namely Michael Cullen, Rory Cox, Jim Dunne, Benny Hurl, Damian Harvey, Judith Browne, Phil Armstrong, Martin Mc Glone, Dominic Mc Clements, Damien Donnelly as well as Oliver Mc Veigh and Sportsfile. In Tyrone we are extremely lucky to have a team of Photographers who give of their time and expertise to ensure "Tyrone are very much kept in the Picture". I thank them again for all their efforts and support. "A picture tells a thousand words" and in Tyrone there is no doubt this is so true.

Club PRO's Seminar: One of the first essential requirements having taken over as County PRO was to touch base with the Club PRO's and build up a close working relationship with all those operating as Club voice for Communications within the Club structures. In order to do this every Club PRO from all the Football and Hurling Clubs as well as those from the Camogie Clubs were individually invited to attend the Seminar.



In total 36 Club PRO's were represented. Special Guest on the night was head of Communications in Croke Park, Alan Milton who presented an overview of what the Role of a Club PRO really involved. In his summary Alan congratulated Tyrone on their initiative,



stating it was by far the biggest gathering of Club PRO's he has ever been asked to address within a County. The whole Clár proved an overwhelming success such was the positive feedback from all that were present. This will hopefully be something that can be built upon in the years ahead.

The Tyrone LCC Club Championship Draws Streamed Live: One of the hugely successful stories of the Communications year was the organising of the Tyrone Club Championship Draws and the unveiling of the New Championship Sponsor The LCC Group. For the first time ever, the Tyrone Club Championship draw was streamed Live across the world and another special aspect to the entire proceedings was the presence of the 3 winning Captains from 50 years ago to conduct the draw. Ardboe's Patsy Forbes the O'Neill Cup winning Captain and Doonan Gallagher from Donaghmore the Paddy Cullen Cup winning Captain was joined by Garry Mc Gahan the captain of the Killyman side who captured the Pat Darcy Junior title. The final piece of the Jigsaw was the presence of every Club Captain from almost all the Football and Hurling Clubs within the County. This proved an Historic night on several fronts and did justice to the unveiling of the new Sponsorship deal with the LCC Group. Tyrone Gaels from across the world were able to tune in and see live who their Club would face in the 2018 Club Championship. The seeds were sown of just what could be achieved in bringing the excitement associated with the action back home even if they happen to be domiciled anywhere in the world.

The Pre Ulster-Championship & Nicky Rickard Cup Press Night: Ahead of this year's Ulster Senior Championship clash with Monaghan and the opening rounds of the Nicky Rickard Cup a hugely successful joint Press night was held with Tyrone Senior Manager Mickey Harte and the Senior Hurling Manager Matty Lennon. This was a first, as a joint venture and it proved a very successful event with a large crowd of both Local and National Press present to quiz the Managers prior to their opening games in their respective Championship encounters. Following on from this and the Tyrone Senior teams successful run to the All-Ireland Semi Final an equally successful Press Event ahead of the All - Ireland Semi Final attracted almost 30 Press and Media Journalists from all over Ireland. The welcome Breakfast upon arrival went down a treat and proved a real hit with all the Press as well as their TV & Radio counterparts. All concerned provided a positive feedback and complemented the unlimited access provided to both the players and the Manager.

Live Streaming - A Success Story: By far one of the most successful ventures overseen by the



Communications core has been the introduction of the Live Streaming of our games within the County. For many years Armagh TV has been operating and providing a much valued service by



bringing the magic and the atmosphere from their Live Championship Games. 2018 saw Tyrone Communications move in a similar direction. Following consultation with those operating Armagh TV as well as the Ulster Council a decision was taken to trial the concept of Tyrone GAATV.

Friday 28th September 2018 will go down as the historic date on which Tyrone GAATV was launched. The Craobh Pelie Sinsear Q/Final clash between Edendork V. Galablly provided the first Live Championship action to be streamed live across the world. The seeds were sown, and the new concept was up and running. The Commentary team of Paddy Hunter and Peter Canavan brought the excitement and the thrill of the Tyrone Championship to many living rooms and homes in all parts of the world. The reaction from those GAA Supporters all over the world was very positive. It was now evident beyond doubt, there was a huge demand for the product and what Tyrone GAATV had to offer. Next up came the Tyrone Cluiche Ceannais Craobh Peile Sóisear between Newtownstewart V. Beragh. This again proved an overwhelming success and then hot on the heels of the Junior Final came the County Senior and Intermediate Championship Finals Sunday deciders ready to be broadcast all around the globe. The additions to the commentary line up included Ger Treacy and Enda Mc Ginley as well as Joe Mc Mahon. With Paddy Hunter and Peter Canavan still on board the entire experience in streaming the games surpassed those done previously. The constructive and positive analysis once more proved there was a huge demand in all parts of the world to see the matches helping put all our exiled Gaels back in touch with their Parish and their roots. There was no way back now, so the next Challenge was to broaden the range of coverage and try to stream the Tyrone Senior League Final. This presented many potential obstacles in terms of broadband coverage, the new location and Press/Media facilities. The Goal was achieved and despite some apprehension the new location of Ballinamullan in Killyclogher went without a hitch and proof was evident we could manage to provide the same standards of coverage as in other grounds outside of Healy Park. The acid test had been passed. I do believe there is the option to consider deferred coverage regarding some of our games. I believe this will again enhance to opportunity for more of our supporters to avail of the Live Streaming of our matches at a time which may prove more beneficial. A further enhancement which could be considered is the potential to provide some replay action from the games including a rerun of the scores. This will add to the quality of what we already provide and make it an even more attractive product.

In summary there are a few key individuals who all played a massive part in making Tyrone GAATV become a reality and they all deserve credit and recognition, so I wish to extend my gratitude to Gerard Bradley for his IT expertise and know how to make the payment portals operational. Gerard provided great back up and support throughout the entire process. To our Volunteer Commentators, namely Paddy Hunter, Gerard Treacy, our guests Peter Canavan, Joe Mc Mahon and Enda McGinley. Each of them played a pivotal role in making this happen. A special debt of gratitude must go to Kieran Mc Mullan and all his professional staff at MAC AV who worked tirelessly to ensure the quality production was of the highest standards possible. We are extremely lucky to have such a company in Tyrone who can provide this magnificent facility and make it available on our very doorsteps. To all Clubs who co-operated without fuss and also played their part in contributing to the occasion I say sincere thanks. I feel without doubt Live Streaming of our games is here to stay and there are no doubt potential revenue resources through Sponsorship or advertising which will enhance the product. Once again Tyrone GAATV will prove a worthwhile and beneficial asset to the Tyrone GAA brand and I am proud to have played my part in helping make it happen.

Conclusion: In conclusion I wish to place on record my gratitude to the staff in Garvaghey, especially Gregory Mc Sorley and Anne Marie as well as Roisin Mc Sorley. Each of them offered great support to me throughout the past year. To Dominic Mc Caughey our County Secretary I say thanks for all



your advice and words of wisdom. Thanks also to Michael Kerr for his guidance during the year. To Michael Geoghegan the Ulster PRO, along with Tyrone man Paul Mc Gurk who were on hand to provide support and advice when required plus Alan Milton, Siobhan Brady, Niamh Boyle, Cian Murphy plus all the other Staff in Croke Park who could be called upon when any query needed some specific advice or guidance. Finally, to all the Club PRO's and Secretaries who provided such a fantastic support to me throughout the past 12 months I am so grateful. Tyrone as a County are lucky to be able to call upon so many talented and dedicated Gaels who provide such dedication to their Clubs and County alike.

The Health & Well Being Subgroup met on 8 occasions in 2018.

The following objectives were set at the start of 2018.

Training/Support

- Ensure healthy club officer details are up to date and provide support.
- Facilitate the county tutors to deliver training to healthy club officers.
- Support clubs selected in phase 3 of the GAA's Healthy Clubs Programme and encourage others to participate in the healthy club process.
- Encourage/Support clubs who wish to work on a cluster basis with neighbouring clubs.

Critical Incident Plan

- Develop and promote the Tyrone County Critical Incident Plan
- Encourage clubs to develop their own Critical Incident plan.
- Facilitate Critical Incident plan training for clubs

Programmes and Initiatives

- Facilitate and promote the new GAA gambling awareness resources.
- Encourage clubs to work with local agencies on their health and wellbeing programmes.
- Promote physical activity in local clubs/communities.
- Promote Cardiac Response training and defibrillator maintenance to clubs.
- Promote on line internet safety awareness training programmes with clubs.
- Promote the Ulster GAA health campaigns/programmes
- Support clubs implementing drugs and alcohol programmes and campaigns.
- Promote the Organ Donor Campaign in conjunction with organ donation NI

Positive mental health promotion and suicide prevention training awareness

- Promote SafeTALK training and other mental health promotion/awareness within the county including Samaritans.
- Continue working with Acadamh Thír Eoghain Coaches and Player Welfare Officer to promote emotional wellbeing of young players



Live to Play

Facilitate at least one 'Live To Play' Initiative in the county.

Social Initiative

- Organise one Social Initiative event.
- Promote the Social Initiative in local clubs to improve health and wellbeing for older members of communities.

Progress in 2018: 2018 is the fifth year the Tír Eoghain Health and Wellbeing Committee has been in operation. The key priority in 2018 has been to support clubs and their health and wellbeing officers/committees. Tír Eoghain are now in the fortunate position of having most clubs having strong health and wellbeing communities which is something that should be acknowledged, commended and encouraged. Whilst this area is not the playing of our games, having clubs with strong health and wellbeing focus will, as evidence identifies, make a club stronger!

The Committee started the year aiming to have 1-2 monthly correspondence to clubs and officers on information relevant to them, however this soon developed to weekly/fortnightly correspondence. We as a committee are conscious that this work is not always seen as the priority in club business, however, clubs who now have been doing this work for a number of years have spoken of the value of having health and wellbeing as an integral part of their clár. We wish to support all club officers and clubs who are either just starting on their journey or who are continuing to develop. To date we have 47 clubs who have named health and wellbeing officers and we would hope that all clubs will have their officers in place for 2019.

Two healthy club officer training sessions were organised in 2018. 22 clubs participated in these sessions and feedback was very positive. Thanks to Sinead Cuddy, Michael Connolly and Nora Rose O'Neill for all their work in delivering these sessions. We have been fortunate to have another tutor Maura McMenamin join us in 2018. Maura brings a wealth of experience from her work with Ulster GAA to the Committee. We have also welcomed the inclusion of health and wellbeing onto Coisti Banisti clár and were appreciative of the opportunity to input into the new strategic plan for the county.

Healthy Clubs Programme: Following on from the success of An Caisleán Glas Cumann Naoimh Padraig agus Naomh Éanna an Ómaigh who both completed Phase 2 of the National Healthy Club Project (HCP) we had a high number of applicants to phase 3 of the programme. The successful clubs were Errigal Ciaran, Gortin and St. Macartans. All three clubs have carried out extensive engagement with their communities and have already been implementing some really positive programmes and initiatives (some examples below). As a county committee we are committed to supporting these clubs through the process and others who may wish to follow in the future.









Critical Incident Plan: The county critical incident plan was adopted at Convention 2017. The first training for clubs took place in March 2018 with 10 clubs taking part. Feedback was extremely positive. The ideal situation would be that clubs may never need to implement the plan. However, for the one time a club may experience an incident that overwhelms them the plan is a good safety net to have. Unfortunately, we now have evidence both from within the county and elsewhere of the benefits of having such a plan in place. Any club who may have queries on developing a critical incident plan is asked to contact any member of the county health & wellbeing committee.

Training and Awareness: During 2018 Ulster GAA worked with AWARE to develop a 'Mindfit' programme which looks at promoting positive mental health and building resilience in underage members. This programme has been piloted and will be rolled out in the county with numerous clubs during 2019. We were fortunate that our academy squads of U15 and U17s participated in the programme and feedback was positive. Already we have 7 clubs who have registered to have the programme rolled out in 2019. The county health and wellbeing committee continue to stress the importance of building resilience in all our youth players. We urge the youth and coaching committees along with CCC and the county welfare officer to ensure this is included in plans for 2019.

Throughout 2018 we as a committee have been promoting training and awareness sessions that have been organised throughout the county by various accredited providers. We are fortunate to have excellent training programmes and awareness sessions being arranged on our doorsteps. We encourage clubs to make contact with their local Health & Social Care Trust Health Improvement Department who have an annual training calendar and promote this training to club members.

Gambling Addiction: Unfortunately Gambling Addiction is increasingly an issue that is raised by our clubs. Whilst the county health and wellbeing committee stress it is not a 'service provider', there is an increasing body of evidence to show there is very little support for individuals who are living with a gambling addiction or living with someone who is experiencing it.

We have been waiting in anticipation for the new GAA training/awareness session for clubs. This has now been finalised. We look forward to rolling this out to clubs in 2019. In the meantime, some of the practical tips that clubs can implement to help address this issue include;



- Avoid the club engaging in gambling activity which particularly encourages irresponsible gambling behaviour e.g. have modest winnings and modest odds for "Night At the Races" type activity
- Limit the number of purchases one person can make in a gambling scenario
- Avoid gambling activity relating to GAA activity
- If using online payment platforms, ensure these are well-managed so as not to promote irresponsible gambling
- Modest promotion of gambling activity, e.g. the club lotto should not be the "stand-out" headline on a club's website
- Consider putting an upper limit on the club lotto.

Defibrillator training: Following a number of high profile situations relating to defibrillators at our grounds we worked with NIAS to promote the installation, maintenance and training in defibrillator usage. Each club by now should have 1 or more fully operational defibrillator. If your club own a defibrillator (also called a Public Access Defibrillator (PAD), it is important that you register it with the Northern Ireland Ambulance Service. The information you give will be used by the Ambulance Control Centre when they receive a 999 call for a cardiac arrest. Using the information you have provided, staff will signpost the caller to the nearest AED. This will help to increase the chance of survival of the person having the cardiac arrest. Clubs are urged to register them via http://www.nias.hscni.net/our-services/aed/register-aed/



Ulster GAA will also be rolling out 'Heartstart' training in 2019, we will notify all clubs when more details are available.



Social Initiative: 2018 saw another successful social initiative trip organised to Croke Park. This year we had 44 attending from 15 clubs. This yearly trip is one which everyone who travels enjoys very much. The trip would not take place without the help of Cuthbert Donnelly and Tracy Monaghan and Anne-Marie in Garvaghey who takes the bookings. Many thanks to them and to all the clubs who

took part. Feedback from everyone was positive and we hope to run the programme again in 2019.

Organ Donor Campaign: 2018 was the first year that the Tir Eoghain Health and Wellbeing committee worked with the NHS Organ Donor Register to launch a campaign. Having had the endorsement from both the ladies and men's county teams we promoted the campaign widely on social media and through match programmes, bibs and stands. Many thanks to everyone who supported the campaign including Kieran Kennedy at O'Neill's who provided the bibs and the clubs



who agreed to wear them on their county final days. The NHS organ donor register is now intending to use the model to work with other sporting codes.





Live to Play: As Ulster GAA are revamping this programme it did not happen in 2018. It is hoped this will run again in 2019.

Promotion of Health and Wellbeing: We have had a tremendous amount of work taking place in our clubs, a small sample is below. Everything from health checks, walkways, Couch to 5ks, mental health promotion programmes, bootcamps, community responders training etc.

We would appeal for this to be promoted more within the county and within clubs. Social media is a powerful platform that we should be using in a positive way for positive messaging.

During the incoming year we would encourage clubs to continue with this work and not to forget to let the county health and wellbeing committee know if they are arranging any events/programmes so that support can be offered, or assistance with the promotion can be provided. Francis Mooney has been vital in raising the profile of health and wellbeing in the county and beyond in 2018 and we are grateful for his work.









Provincially: The support received from Ulster, in particular Maura McMenamin, has been invaluable in the last year. We look forward to this continuing in future.

Nationally:2018 saw a new Chairperson and new priorities for the GAA National Health and Wellbeing Committee. As a county we will be required to consider these when planning for 2019 work.

Future priorities: A reminder of the GAA's mission statement leaves us in no doubt about the importance of our communities wellbeing;

'We are dedicated to ensuring that our family of games, and the values we live, enrich the lives of our members, families and the communities we serve.'



As a county subcommittee we rely on local clubs and club health and wellbeing officers to work with us. We will continue to be a support mechanism for local clubs in 2019. Nationally Croke Park have identified a number of priority Actions for 2019 for all County Health and Wellbeing Committees including;

- 1. Continued developed of county and club health and wellbeing committees
- 2. Facilitate health club officer training within the county
- 3. Support the development of critical incident plans and training
- 4. Support clubs on phase 3 of the healthy clubs programme
- 5. Continue to promote SafeTALK training.
- 6. Promote the social initiative
- 7. Promote the GAA new gambling awareness resources.

These priorities along with additional suggestions from our clubs will be the focus for 2019. For more information on this or if you have any queries or concerns in relation to health and wellbeing issues in your club/community please email chair.hwc.tyrone@gaa.ie or hwb.tyrone@gaa.ie

To the clubs and officers who have worked tirelessly over the last 5 years and who have embraced this new area of GAA business 'head on'. I thank them most sincerely for their trust and work and would urge them and others to continue the momentum. I thank the County management committee for their support and I would appeal that they continue to give health and wellbeing its rightful place on their clár ensuring regular updates.

Finally I would like to wish the 2019 subcommittee best wishes in its work.

4.Strategic Implementation Committee Cathaoirleach: Seamas Mac Domhnaill

The Strategic Implementation Committee met eleven times during 2018. The members and their attendance is as follows:

All Committees and Workgroups were asked to submit their work plans before the end of March. Two committees, Coaching and Games, and Hurling Development have not submitted workplans for 2018.

Although in 2017 the Committee had consulted with clubs, committees and with statutory agencies we conducted, at the beginning of the year further consultations with the subcommittees and the members of the County Committee. After the draft plan was approved by the County Committee the Strategy for Tyrone GAA 2018 – 2022 Ag Ardú Níos Airde Aris na Laimhe Deirge was published in late April.

In addition to our regular monthly meetings, members of the committee also met with Communications, Garvaghey Management, Finance, Referees Administration, Fixtures Analysts, Health and Wellbeing, Information Technology, Integration, Language and Culture, Planning Physical Development and Safety, and PR & Marketing committees to discuss their work. We were unable to meet with and discuss the work with Competitions Control, Coaching and Games, and Hurling Development committees.

The Strategic Implementation Committee was impressed with the professionalism and dedication of the members of the various committees we met. Those committees were working though their plans and I am happy to say that the majority of their targets had been achieved. Committees displayed a maturity in recognising a need for a change in their approach and we await the positive outcomes.

Some committees felt that there was a lack of awareness of and in some situations a lack of recognition for their work. In a few cases there was an overlap of work with other committees. One aspect to emerge was the diminishing pool of volunteers within the Association. Whilst in recent years the role of the volunteer has been highlighted in our publications, all committees highlighted the need for more volunteers. Volunteers breathe life into an organisation. As one committee member expressed the point very succinctly, "We need volunteers to keep us from growing tired and stale "

Many comments were also expressed about our adult and youth games.

Suggestions

- 1. All subcommittees should submit their work plans, on the pro forma provided, for approval by the County Committee by 31st March.
- 2. Subcommittees could meet with other subcommittees to discuss their plans for the forthcoming year.
- 3. Subcommittees could look at ways to recognise the volunteer and to recruit more.
- 4. Garvaghey and its resources is a fantastic resource to the county. Subcommittees should examine how they could make greater use of this resource.
- 5. Complete the review of the role of the County Committee member.
- 6. Review our games to ensure that the club and county are well served by our competitions.

Finally I thank the subcommittees who cooperated with the Strategic Implementation Committee, the members of the SIG for their commitment, and to the Cathaoirleach and Rúnai Coiste Bainistí for their support and leadership throughout the year.

A target has now been set for all clubs in Tír Eoghain to participate in Scór Competition in the year 2020 which marks the 50th anniversary of the introduction of Scór into Tír Eoghain. 1969 was the first year where the competition was held only in Cork. Such was the success it was approved by Congress and rolled out to all counties in the following year. Consequently, Tír Eoghain will celebrate the Golden Jubilee in 2020.

Many thanks are extended to all the clubs in Tír Eoghain who hosted Scór events during the last year and to all the Culture Officers in clubs who co-operated so willingly with An Coiste. Forthcoming dates for Scór events are as follows:

Match entertainment: The programme where live music is provided at all Inter county games, Comhairle Uladh games and finals of Tír Eoghain County Championships will continue as many of the clubs who attain County Championship status are always ready and willing to perform on the public stage at venues such as Healy Park. Our thanks, in particular, go to the many clubs who have obliged, and played for us — An Goirtín, An Ómaigh, both Scór na nÓg and Scór Sinsear, Fionntamhnach, Domhnach Mór, Doire Locháin agus An Chraobh.

Forbairt - "Ag dul ó neart go neart"

Amhrán na bhFiann: An Coiste continues providing singers for the National anthem at all intercounty, Comhairle Uladh and Tyrone club championship finals in the county. The committee has assisted some clubs in preparing training for new singers of the anthem and will continue to do so when required. As part of our increased use of the website and social media Amhrán na bhFiann, sung by Dearbhla Ní Scealláin, has been loaded on the website (on the Gaeilge page) to help clubs prepare singers for club events at their own grounds.

Coiste Cultúir agus Teanga engaged in a survey of all the club championship games in Tír Eoghain for the levels of Irish used at the games which included signage in Irish, scoreboards using Irish, match



announcements and the clarity of public address systems etc. The results will hopefully help to provide a more comprehensive use of the national language and greater spectator enjoyment of our games.

An Teanga: An Coiste continues to promote and develop the Gaeltacht Scholarship scheme. This was the third year of the revised scheme whereby Coiste an Chontae sponsored the plan to the tune of £5000, for which we are greatly indebted. Tír Eoghain now supports the promotion of the Irish Language very much in line with most of the other Ulster Counties. One hundred and six children from thirty-three clubs and fourteen schools in Tír Eoghain (including one primary school) availed of the scheme and attended language courses at five of the main Gaeltacht Colleges in Dún na nGall – Rann na Feirste, Loch an Iúir, Teileann, Bun an Inbhir agus Machaire Rabhartaigh and one additional college on Oileán Árainn.

Cúrsa Gaeilge – Séamus de Faoite: An added dimension will be added to the Séamus de Faoite course for next year in that a Ciorcal Comhrá (Conversational Circle) section will be added, to the existing Bun Rang, Meán Rang and Ard Rang, to allow those who wish to engage in conversational Irish to be accommodated. As usual members from Tír Eoghain clubs made up the biggest contingent of the counties in Ulster. This course continues to be of immense value to adult members of GAA clubs throughout Cúige Uladh. It is also totally free of charge.

Tráth na gCeist Boird: Coiste Cultúir agus Teanga run heats annually in Tír Eoghain and bring forward teams to a Comhairle Uladh Final, held during Seachtaine na Gaeilge in Ard Mhacha. This is an all Irish Language Tráth na gCeist competition which is thoroughly enjoyable and informative. Four clubs from Tír Eoghain were present at the finals this year.

Suíomh Gréasáin agus Athbhreithniú ar Scór:Ba í bunú leathanach a dhíríonn isteach ar an Ghaeilge amháin ar shuíomh ghréasáin Thír Eoghain an ghné ba thábhachtaí i mbliana. Is í Tír Eoghain an chéad chontae i gCúige Uladh a bhfuil leathanach acu a dhíríonn isteach ar an teanga amháin. Ar an leathanach tá 10 gceacht phíolóta ar labhairt na teanga, ainmneacha clubanna, paidreacha, seanfhocail srl. Tá féidearthachtaí móra le forbairt an leathanaigh seo agus tá sé beartaithe cur leis. Mar chuid de seo beidh muid ag seoladh scéim phíolóta do chuid bunscoileanna sa chontae a thabharfaidh seans d'aois óg an chontae a gcuid scileanna Gaeilge labhartha a fhorbairt. Mar aon leis seo tá an Coiste Cultúir sásta tacaíocht a thabhairt do chlubanna an teanga a fhorbairt ag a gclubanna le léamh profaí comharthaíochta nó cáipéisí ar bith dá gcuid chun a dheimhniú go bhfuil an Ghaeilge chruinn sula gcuirfear i gcló í. In amanna choncthas go raibh meancóga Gaeilge le feiceáil i gcomharthaíocht.



Website and Review of Scór: In order to further develop Scór and the language it was essential to develop strategies, which should comply with the Tír Eoghain strategy document "Ag Ardú Níos Airde Arís na Láimhe Deirge" comprehensive reviews were carried out. Focus groups were set up in the county to examine all aspects of Culture and Heritage. The Scór review document, which is in booklet form, was distributed to the County Committee and can be downloaded from the 'Downloads' section on the Tír Eoghain website. The language review will also provide some interesting factual information.

One of the very important issues in the past year was the introduction of a web page on the Tír Eoghain website totally dedicated to the Irish language. Tír Eoghain are the first county in Cúige Uladh which has a page dedicated to An Teanga. This has begun with ten pilot lessons on Irish vocabulary, club names, prayers, proverbs etc. The scope for development on this is huge and plans are in place to make additions to the page. This would include initially a pilot scheme among a selected group of primary schools within the county, to develop further an additional way to promote the Irish language among the youth of the county.

Additionally, to this Coiste Cultúir are willing to assist clubs in the promotion of the language round their clubs in that any signage or documents coming out of clubs will be proof read, to ensure accuracy, before any of these come into the public domain. On occasions it has been remarked that signage etc, in Irish, is incorrectly spelt or presented.

Acknowledgements: I would like to acknowledge the help and encouragement from the members of the sub-committee who provided assistance at all levels of promotion and development of our culture and heritage, in what has become an almost year-round scheme of work and even as this convention takes place the activities of the clubs and competitors are at their busiest. Also, many thanks are due to the members of an Coiste Bainistí and Coiste an Chontae for all their help and encouragement during the course of the past year.

Website and Social Media: We continued to update the Website, in terms of content and structure. Management Committee requested that the website would be re-established as the primary source of information for club and county fixtures. The viewing figures for each month were published and there has been over a 50% increase in the number of views and an audience of over 50,000 people who visit the website on a regular basis. Results were updated in two formats, directly from the Referee's input and a Summary Post on the evening following a round of fixtures. The two formats have proved very popular and attract very substantial traffic with relatively good response times. In previous years, all our Twitter updates were automatically copied to Facebook. The website shows Facebook and Twitter feeds in a side by side display, so the duplication was unnecessary. Live updates from matches are now posted on Twitter with summaries on Facebook. This change and a more focused approach to the use of Social Media has also substantially increased our viewing audience.

A survey of club Websites and Social Media platforms was conducted in November of this year. All clubs in Tyrone now have a Social Media platform with most clubs using both Facebook and Twitter. The number of active websites is decreasing and many of the older out of date sites have been taken off-line since last year. While websites do require a certain level of technical knowledge to maintain they have a greater potential to raise revenue via sponsorship than Social Media and allow more detailed documentation to be made available to members.

Live Streaming: This year it was decided to trial Live Streaming on a 'Pay Per View' (PPV) basis. To provide this service we had to put in place a number of pieces of technical infrastructure. An Internet connection with a minimum upload speed of 3Mbps, a Content Delivery Network (CDN) to download the live stream to subscribers and high definition cameras combined with an editing system. The broadband in Healy Park was upgraded to a high speed FTTC connection. When the stand was constructed the M&E specification included a fibre connection around the pitch to the control tower. We were able to use this infrastructure to establish a high-speed Internet connection from the Control Tower. The CDN service and associated software was purchased on a monthly rental basis. Camera work and editing are provided by MacAV on a match by match basis.

Four matches were streamed this year and a total of 2275 subscribers viewed these matches. The Division 1 League final was streamed from Killyclogher using a different type of internet technology and again this was very successful. The use of this technology should make it possible to stream from a wider range of venues, providing we can establish the required connection speed. In all four matches we were able to deliver high quality Live Stream and this was combined with excellent commentary/analysis arranged by the Communication Committee. While we have some level of control in providing the upload of the live stream, the download is totally dependent on the type and quality of internet connection each subscriber has in their own location. Many areas in Tyrone would still not have a reliable 3Mbps download connection. Almost all subscribers, did receive a high-quality live stream without any buffering. There are still a very small minority of subscribers who cannot access the emailed link, because their email account has a firewall to block unknown emails or they are unable get email that has been redirected to their Spam/Junk folder. Overall the trial has established that we can provide a high quality live streaming service and this facility is financially viable. Subscribers were able to watch our club games live in 5 continents and over 30



countries. We can be confident that our service was amongst the best in the country and compares very favourable with national and international broadcasters.

IT Support, Servasport and GDPR: This support is on request for County Officers, staff and club officials. There are now four GAA IT systems where we provide some level of local support, Office 365, Servasport, Registration for the Players' Injury Fund and the National Club Draw system.

Office 365 accounts are provided to the Chairperson, Secretary, Treasurer and PRO of all clubs. There was an increased uptake for these accounts by club officers but, to comply with the Official Guide, all of these officers in every club should be using their @gaa.ie account. The use of OneDrive for club documentation is not only recommended but is certainly the safest way to secure data and comply with GDPR.

Once again, I would like to remind club officers that the @gaa.ie email addresses should not be used for personal correspondence.

For many clubs, the Servasport system, tends to be seasonal exercise, ending with the submission of registrations at the end of March. With the introduction of GDPR in May 2018, clubs have an obligation to check that data held on the system is accurate and up to date. Simply clicking on every listed member and resubmitting each year could leave a club in breach of the new regulations. New membership forms complying with GDPR were produced by Croke Park and are available on our website. Clubs should use these forms to update the Servasport system with information collected on the forms and to comply with GDPR. The regulations put the onus on clubs to keep accurate and up to date information.

The CCC members use the Servasport system in conjunction with Referees' Administrator. Appointments are made by SMS and results are automatically displayed on our website when they are submitted by the referee. Referees should be aware that the Results and League tables on the website are only updated when they reply to the SMS message they receive after each fixture. The County purchased new communications sets for referees and officials. These have now replaced the older and increasingly unreliable system.

IT Infrastructure and Finance: The Video links to all outlets in Garvaghey were remapped and this allows us to use the screens in any part of the building to display different presentations, video or television. The link to the external noticeboard is currently being upgraded.

The proposed upgrade of the IT Infrastructure in Healy Park to allow connection of scanners and POS machines to the central servers will be part of a larger proposed upgrade of facilities. Croke Park will provide a grant for the IT infrastructure that should cover the financial outlay for this part of the project. When completed online sales and card payments will be fully integrated into the admission system. Our financial records are stored on a secure cloud based system, which provides reports and full traceability of our accounting procedures.

Cyber Security and Data Protection: Clubs and Officers should ensure that computers or mobile devices that are used to store or send email have reliable Anti-Virus software installed and regularly updated (at least weekly). Usernames and passwords should not be shared for any GAA IT system. Using the GAA Onedrive for storage and updated Anti-Virus software is an integral part of the defence against Cyber attack.

The remit of the Hearings Committee is to endeavour at all times to make decisions correctly, within rule and without favour, based on the evidence presented by both the appellant and the CCC. The standard set out in the Official Guide for use in all decisions is that the Hearings Committee must be satisfied that the infraction is 'more likely to have occurred than not to have occurred.' Sometimes, depending on the specific circumstances of each case and the evidence presented, the members of the committee are left with a very difficult decision to make but at all times everyone strives to be fair and honest in arriving at their decision. As each case is different the committee have to assess the evidence presented before them and adjudicate on the disputed facts or interpretations in dispute. It is by discharging this function fairly and in good faith that the Hearings Committee provides the best service to the Association.

When any member /unit feel the decision made was incorrect, they then have the right of appeal to the Ulster Hearings Committee. We fully respect this, irrespective of the outcome of any appeal.

In the period from 15th March to 15th November 2018 Coiste Eisteachta met on 24 occasions with three of these being emergency meetings. In total there were 49 cases where a hearing was requested with nine of these being withdrawn before the hearing took place. In sixteen cases sanctions ranging from a one match ban to a twelve-week suspension were imposed, in three cases the infraction was reduced to a yellow card offence, in eight cases the defendant was deemed to have no case to answer and in one case a transfer was granted. One case which was an internal Club issue was referred back to the Club for reprocessing and in a second internal Club issue a suspension was issued. One case was adjourned and withdrawn as the proposed sanction was accepted. In six cases the claimant was unable to attend on the given date and a Hearing notification was reissued. There was one decision appealed to the Ulster Hearings Committee which was upheld.

One point of note is that while most Club Executive Committees are aware of the procedure involved in requesting a hearing by following the protocol laid out by CHC at the beginning of the season, there still remains a number who have diffculty communicating their requests particularly in the restricted time frame of League and Championship.

I would like to express my sincere thanks to all the committe members for their co-operation and committment throughout the year with special thanks to Margaret Keenan in her role as secretary. Thanks also to Sean McElroy for deputising as chairperson when needed and to Mary Daly for standing in for Margaret when the occasion arose.

On behalf of the committee I would like to acknowlege the work and co-operation of Dominic McCaughey County Secretary, Disciplinary Secretary Sarah Jane Kelly, Eunan Lindsay and Mel Taggart from the CCC and Gregory McSorley in Garvaghey.

The Committee in 2018

During the year ended 31 October 2018 our Sub-Committee continued its focus on fund-raising for Tyrone GAA and developing our County's PR and Marketing agenda. Eugene McConnell joined us this year as our newly-elected County PRO as did Michael Kerr, Ex-Officio as our new County Chair.

We held 10 formal monthly meetings this the year, attended as follows: Gerard Bradley (8), Adrian Colton (5), Eileen Connolly (2), Mark Conway (10), Declan Devlin (8), Roisin Dooher/Shanks (8), Jackie Duffy (5), Patsy Forbes (5), Patrick Harte (5), Damian Harvey (4), Martin Haughey (10), Eunan Lindsay (6), John Mulgrew (6) and Michael Winters (10). Each meeting was minuted and reported to the Tyrone County Committee. In addition, several 'job/event-specific' meetings were held during the year and our Committee was delighted to contribute to a number of Tyrone Management Committee meetings. We were also in attendance at all Tyrone County Committee meetings.



County Chair Michael Kerr (6 meetings) and County Treasurer Raymond McKeown (1) are welcomed Ex-Officio members of our Committee and immediate Past Tyrone GAA President Jimmy Treacy remains an honorary and important member. We also continue to obtain valuable ongoing input, support and advice from Peter Canavan, Mickey Harte, Niall Laird, Hugh McAleer, Paul McAnallen, Naomh McElhatton, Noel McGinn, Brian Murray and Fehin Quinn. Beyond Tyrone, the work of Mickey Coleman, Fay Devlin, Paul Donnelly, Tómas McGarvey, Bill McInerney, Seamus McNelis and their colleagues remains inspirational. We are, simply, blessed to have them.

The Committee's Work in 2018

The Committee's Work-Plan for 2018 was presented to and approved by the County Committee at the start of the year. It was then delivered on as follows:

- Oversaw and managed Club Tyrone Members', Garvaghey Patrons' and Dragain Thir Eoghain net cash contributions which met the targets set in our Work-Plan (at the time of writing the detail of Tyrone's Accounts for 2018 is not finalized)
- Currently finalizing a 'gift aid' tax repayment of up to £20,000 from HMRC
- Continued the good progress in developing Club Tyrone 'hubs' in New York and London, including organizing and delivering a pioneering coaching contribution in New York in July 2018
- Produced and circulated to every school in Tyrone 20,000 copies of the Red Hand Fanzine
- Hosted the Annual Club Tyrone Members' Night in May, attended by over 200 Patrons, Members and friends: also hosted a pre-All-Ireland Final chat-night at Garvaghey on 29 August
- Developed the 'Many Hands, One County' social media marketing initiative in the lead-up to the All-Ireland Final, followed by a hosting of our 'Club Tyrone Diaspora' in the Croke Park Hotel on the eve of the All-Ireland Final
- Held our now-annual 'Meet the Players' event after the Kerry Allianz League game in March (with, yet again, sterling support from Omagh St Enda's and Communications Committee members)
- Hosted workshops on County Fundraising (11 November 2017) and (two) on developing Tyrone GAA's social media presence (June/July 2018)
- Organized a well-supported Club Tyrone Golf Classic in the Lough Erne Golf Resort on 22 June, something we hope to retain and develop as an annual event
- Produced business cases for the Garvaghey Performance Hub and Healy Park developments
- Hosted, at Garvaghey, a St Brigid's Cross-Making workshop (31 January), talks on Gaelic Sunday (4 August) and (with significant input from Petsie Kennedy) a celebration of Tyrone's 1968 All-Ireland Junior Champions (29 September)
- Contributed to Tyrone GAA's Red Hand View match programmes
- Published the 2017 Club Tyrone Annual Report and circulated it to Members, Patrons and others

(Support for several of the events above by the Fermanagh and Omagh District Council is gratefully acknowledged.)

Our Committee had concerns about how the Tyrone GAA title sponsorship issue was handled at the start of this year. And it remains disappointing that, following our drafting of a model for a possible Tyrone Club/County Draw over a year ago, this vital initiative has again not been progressed. During the year we were delighted to attend 'brother/sister County GAA events' in Antrim (Saffron Business Forum), Derry (1993 All-Ireland celebration) and Down (1968 All-Ireland celebration). Ar scath a cheile a mhaireann na daoine/people live in one another's shelter.



'Thall o na Toim ... Beyond the Bushes'

During 2018 our strong Club Tyrone presences in New York and London were developed further.

In July we delivered on our commitment to provide coaching in New York and Club Tyrone New York hosted a second annual Golf Classic at Hudson National on 11 October as well as Members' events in Manhattan. Several home-based Tyrone GAA volunteers willingly gave us their time to support these events and that commitment is gratefully acknowledged. Club Tyrone London hosted the 'St Mungo's' GAA-based play on 19 May.

It is vital that we remain close to our committed Tyrone Gaels in those great cities and that we build on the outstanding work already done. Events like our 'All-Ireland Eve Diaspora' event in the Croke Park Hotel must remain an ongoing part of what we do.

Looking to 2019 and Beyond

Over the next year we need to maintain our emphasis and focus on what is our core business – managing and developing Club Tyrone's unique planned giving model. It's something that's very precious and remains the envy of most others outside Tyrone.

In March this year we undertook a review of where we think Tyrone stands on these fronts. Among our conclusions were:

- As a group we (Club Tyrone) are getting older and succession planning at all levels and in all ways is essential
- Tyrone is now a '£1.3m+ pa turnover business', responsible for an £8m capital asset at Garvaghey: our County needs to be organized, structured and managed accordingly
- There is a growing body of work to be done by Tyrone GAA in its commercial realm, re sponsors and via social media/digital marketing. This years' innovative live streaming of games and events and our 'Many Hands, One County' initiative are very welcome and positive developments in that direction.

There are significant challenges there for all of us to face.

Club Tyrone does not happen by accident. It thrives because we have a County and people in it who know and appreciate what the GAA is and who are therefore very willing to support it so selflessly. At the heart of this all we have a PR and Marketing Committee made up of talented, selfless and totally committed people who just want to see Tyrone GAA do well and who will do whatever's needed to help make that happen. They are a gift to Tyrone and few others in life have the privilege of working with such people.

Work Plan 2018

The Garvaghey Management Group is charged with managing and developing the excellent facility with which we have been gifted by the hard work, endeavour and generosity of the Tyrone GAA family at home and abroad. This is managed by a collective gathering of skills and knowledge guided but not limited by a Work Plan set out at the beginning of each year. At our April meeting, the Group agreed the following Work Plan for 2018:

- To continue to develop and manage Garvaghey as a specific cost centre within Tyrone GAA achieving 55,000 users
- To manage the Centre within budgets agreed by the Tyrone County Committee earning an income of £35k
- Continue to realise the benefits of reduced energy costs through the efficient management of the Wind Turbine
- Maintain savings to Tyrone GAA by hosting all appropriate Tyrone GAA activity in Garvaghey
- Continue to work towards providing a High Performance Hub | Community Activity Centre
- Complete the Food Serving Area and Activity Studio
- Implement the recommendations from the STRI Report addressing the drainage characteristics on Pitch 2 removing the surface in its entirety and re-establishing pitch
- Devise a schedule of necessary internal and external maintenance
- Report as required to the Tyrone County Committee and County Convention

At our first meeting thanks were extended to outgoing Chairperson, Roisin Jordan for all her guidance and support throughout her three years in charge. We also acknowledged the contribution of Sarahjane Kelly thanking her for all her hard work during her five years as Development Officer. We are confident that both Roisin and Sarahjane will continue to serve Tyrone GAA in the future and wish them all the best in future endeavours. We welcomed Michael Kerr to the Group and congratulated him on succeeding Roisin as County Chairperson. Hugh McCallan joined the Group in February bringing with him a wealth of knowledge and experience on Pitch Management, an area which continues to provide us with a major challenge.

The Work Plan we set annually can only be achieved and hopefully in some areas exceeded by the hard work, dedication and skill set of the Garvaghey Management Group and I thank them all for their hard work and support throughout the year.

Financials

Grants:

• During 2018 Fermanagh and Omagh District Council awarded £20k towards the proposed Performance Hub with the proviso that it is used by the end of March 2019. Thanks are extended to Mark for his work in securing this funding.

Operational:

- A target of 55,000 users was set based on last year's usage.
- The wind turbine continues to be a source of income earning almost £50k in ROC's payments, which will eventually offset its cost.
- Our aim was to manage the Centre within the budgets agreed by the Tyrone County Committee based on previous years running costs, these figures for 2018 will be detailed in the end of year Accounts.



Capital Projects:


Pitch Performance: One of the most challenging areas to manage on all levels is that of the pitches at Garvaghey. It remains a fine balancing act to have pitches available while ensuring they are rotated regularly to minimize damage and allow for maintenance work to be carried out. Due to the ongoing drainage problems with the pitches, an Agronomist Report was commissioned which recommended removal in its entirety and restructure of Pitch 2. This work was carried out by Hackett Bros. at a cost of £29k and was delivered both on time and within budget. We are grateful to Brian and thank him most sincerely for his meticulous dedication and management of this project. It is hoped that this pitch will be ready to use again early July 2019.

Wind Turbine: The wind turbine continues to pay back the investment outlaid, this year almost £50k was received in ROC's payments. A Maintenance Contract has been put in place with FES Solutions and thanks are extended to Sean Byrne for his continued guidance and expertise.



- As in previous years the primary use of Garvaghey is to use the pitches with over 84% coming to Garvaghey to use our outdoor facilities.



• The gender balance of users remains 75:25 men-to-women and the age balance is 63:37 between Over and Under 18s

This year these included workshops on Planning, Developing and Managing County Centres, PR & Marketing Strategy, Social Media Strategy led by Naomh Curran, St. Brigid's Cross-Making, talks on Gaelic Sunday, Club Tyrone Members' Night, Pre-All Ireland Chat Show and the celebration of the Golden Jubilee of Tyrone's 1968 Junior All-Ireland success. Garvaghey also had the honour of playing host to Uachtarán na hÉireann, Michael D Higgins on his first official visit to Tyrone courtesy of Fintona Comhaltas Ceoltóiri Éireann to mark the formation of the Group. This was a very successful event for Fintona and we thank Fintona CCE for allowing us to share this experience. Our County Headquarters also played host to screenings of Laochra Gael & Tír Eoghain-The Unbreakable Bond. A visit from Glasgow Gaels GFC allowed us to showcase all that is good about Garvaghey with Ryan Daly leading a coaching session, the provision of a tour of the facility and welcome refreshments.

SENIOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP:


The introduction of the Super 8's and the other changes made to the intercounty championship has seen more time being made available for the club championship. This is welcome and helped ensured the smooth running of the championship.

Once again the Tyrone championships were very competitative and the main feature in the club calender. The championship structure does not require any change, however in an ideal world it would be advantageous to finish the league before the championship starts.


The Reserve Championship commenced before the senior championship in 2018. This is the second year of this change. The impact looks to be positive, games were played in the summer months and a higher focus was placed by clubs on this years competition.

ADULT SENIOR LEAGUE FOOTBALL:

The all-county adult league started on Sunday 31st of March, with senior and intermediate leagues finishing on the 28th of October (excluding play-off games). The league season for Senior and Intermediate teams increased by five weeks (for the majority of clubs) compared to 2017.



A major gap in the league program for Senior & Internediate clubs appears in the months of July & August. There was no league played between the 1st of July and the 9th of September. This repesents a gap of 9 weeks in our league program, this gap is not sustainable.




One observation we have noted is the gap developing between the top teams in the leagues and those at the bottom. Of the 47 games played between the top 4 and bottom 4 across the devisions only 1 match was won by a bottom 4 team. In division 3 the gap is alarming with a13 point spread between the top 4 and bottom 4



ADULT RESERVE FOOTBALL LEAGUE:

Like previous years, the number of reserve games conceded is a concern. There was a slight increase in the number of games played in Division 2 and 3. The league progresses smoothly up to the summer break. After the break, there was a marked increase in the number of games conceded.

Several initiatives have been introduced to try to boost the number of games played. These have had a limited impact. However, we believe that the fixture schedule is not the sole reason for the continued concern around the number of games been played.



HURLING:

There are three types of Hurling Clubs in Tyrone. Those that are established and are fielding at Adult Level, Clubs that are established and are struggling to field and emerging clubs. Tyrone Clubs played a total of 101 official games at adult and youth.

Three clubs each played over 20 adult games. The other two clubs that fielded at Senior played less than 10 games each. Eight clubs took part in Youth Hurling, including a number of the emerging clubs. Unfortunately participation levels was patchy



Above is a summary of all youth football games played within Tyrone for 2018.

Only three clubs did not field in youth, at any age, or were not part of an organised amalgamated team. Two only fielded at one age level and one at two age levels. The average number of game played by a club (Under 14 to Under 21) was 28, from the chart we can see that over half the clubs played 30 plus youth games while almost one quarter played less than 20 games.

There was a major change made to the Under 21 competition for 2018. There were a similar number of fixtures made for 2017 and 2018, but the fulfilment rate more than doubled. This also meant that the average number of games played by each club also doubled. The length of the season also reduced, from 21 to 12 weeks, resulting in an improved frequency of games, 10 to 15 days between games in 2018 compared to 21 to 120 days in 2017.

OUR RECOMMENDATIONS:

To try and address some of the issues highlighted in page 2, we believe that the clubs should consider the following options. Option 1 can be implemented for the 2019 season while option 2 & 3 will take an additional season before they could go live.

Option 1

- · 3 starred games held back and played in the months of July & August
- Introduction of a 3rd competition to be played without county players, thus bridging gaps in the playing calendar.
- · No change to Championship structure.

Option 2:

- 5 leagues, 10 teams in 1A, 1B, 2A and 2B. With 9 teams in league 3.
- 9 starred games and 9 non starred games (18 games in total). Every team plays each other twice once as a starred game and once as a non-starred game.
- Championship based on league and Championship performance from previous year.
 - Senior Championship: Winners of Senior and Intermediate Championships, plus the 14 highest placed teams in the League, from the previous year. (16)
 - Intermediate Championship: Winners of the Junior Championship, plus the highest 15 placed team in League that have not qualified for the Senior Championship. (16)
 - Junior Championship: All Remaining Adult (A) teams. (17)

- 4 leagues of 12 teams in 1A, 1B and Division 2. With 13 teams in league 3.

The committee met 3 times, 15 Feb, 8 May and 12 September

The main targets for the Sub-Committee in 2018 were to:

- Aim for more discussion/engagement of Integration at GAA, LGFA and Camogie County Committee meetings
- Work with other subcommittees in Tyrone GAA to develop opportunities for Integration across Tyrone Gaelic Games family.

The key areas where a more Integrated approach can be taken forward were identified as:

- 1. Hurling Development
- 2. CCC; A representative from each code, from each CCC and responsible for fixtures, review all fixtures, Tyrone GAA, Ladies GFA, Handball & Camogie to avoid clashes.
- 3. Coaching & Games Development
- 4. Governance

In 2019 the committee will support each code as required in these areas.

12.Referees' Administration Committee Cathaoirleach: John Devlin (Pomeroy)

A total of 11 meetings was held during the year: John Devlin 11, Alan Richardson 11, Mark O Neill 6, Michael McCarron 7, Fabian McGlone 10, Fergal Ward 9, Eugene McConnell 10, Martin Mohan 10.

The Committee held the first meeting of the year on Tuesday 9th January 2018. Members were appointed their designated roles and responsibilities for the incoming year.



Referee Preparation for the incoming Season

- Criteria for all referees is to complete the in-service course annually and the first course for referees took place on 15th January 2018 with a second in-service course held on the 19th February 2018.
- Thanks to Brendan Toland who refreshed our referees on the rules and procedures needed for the year ahead.
- We held a rules revision night on the 26th February 2018 which covered the playing rules of Gaelic football.
- The fitness test and written rules test for the League took place on 12th March 2018 and a repeat test on the 26th March 2018.
- The Championship Fitness test took place on the 18th June 2018.
- In preparation for the Championship a Seminar was held on the 13th August 2018, Sean Hurson put together a marvellous presentation and his delivery of the same captivated the referees, the presentation covered pre-match preparation; the rules on Red, Yellow and Black card infractions, linesmen and side line officials.
- A recommendation for a Concussion Workshop arose after a club raised concerns about the health and wellbeing of a player during a game in 2017, the presentation proved very beneficial to the referees in attendance.
- Thanks to Ryan Mellon for giving an excellent presentation on player health and welfare.

New Referees and Mentoring: In 2018 we had 9 new referees who between them took charge of 159 games all of whom should be commended for making themselves available with 2 of them refereeing over 40 matches each. Fergal Ward co-ordinated the mentoring programme very efficiently setting achievable goals for referees and mentors alike, each new referee received a mentor visit to three of their games who give advice on pre-match preparation, dress code, rules, positioning and report writing. The Mentors provided the referees with positive feedback on their performances and highlighted areas for improvement if necessary.

Advisors: The Advisor programme was led by Michael McCarron who along with John Coney, Henry McNally, and Alan Richardson carried out the assessments on referees in the league and championship. Croke Park introduced a new advisor form for the championship and the referee advisors found it to be less labour intensive as the previous form took up to 5 hours to complete. An Advisors' report consists of positive areas of performance, areas of improvements, key game decisions, referee positioning, teamwork with other officials, overall control, aggressive fouls, technical fouls and dissent. These reports assist the referee in identifying areas that they excel in and areas that may need attention.

Recruitment: It is with regret I should highlight that 8 clubs within our county don't have a Club Referee. These clubs need to be proactive in finding someone who is willing to take up the whistle and relieve the pressure on some of our overworked referees. Every year the county loose good skilled referees through retirement, it is imperative that we replace these referees to have an adequate number of officials to allow for the free flow of fixtures. Recruitment of new referees will take place in the new year. Croke Park are currently working on a new foundation and in-service course which will include child protection training for all referees. Due to the increasing number of hurling clubs being established in Tyrone we are also needing to recruit referees from these clubs.



Intercounty and National Referees: Sean Hurson had an excellent season receiving recognition for his skill and dedication as a referee. He started the season taking charge of a McKenna cup game, followed by 5 National league games one of which was the Division 2 final between Cavan and Roscommon. Sean performed consistently throughout the championship refereeing 3 games and was respectfully awarded the All Ireland Minor Final between Kerry and Galway. A proud day for Tyrone GAA.

Ulster Referees: The following referees had an active season in Ulster with both football and hurling, covering McKenna Cup, Under 17s League and Championship, Under 20s and Ulster Club Championship. They are Martin Conroy, Kieran Eannetta, Stephen Campbell and Barry Winters.

Kieran Eannetta was appointed to be the man in the middle of the Monaghan v Down U17 Championship in Omagh prior to the Senior game involving Tyrone and Monaghan, whilst most people went home disappointed at the result of the senior game I left Healy Park very happy because I had witnessed a Tyrone referee who was able to perform on the big stage, he was competent and in control of a high intensity game that went to extra time. Barry Winters has worked hard at Ulster level and this year was appointed to referee the Ulster Intermediate Hurling Final - St Galls of Antrim v Keady of Armagh: he also provided support at National level by acting as Linesman in National Hurling League – Well Done!

Ulster Academy: Referee Gary Gormley is progressing through the Ulster Referees Academy which he joined in January 2018. In this his first year he had the honour of being appointed to Referee the Final of the U15 Inaugural Brian McLernon Cup.

Academy / Schools: Ryan Daly and Sean Hurson have worked tirelessly going into the schools and colleges to run referee courses that enables the year 13 pupils to referee school, under 12 and go games. Clubs should be made aware that these young people are a valuable resource available to them for their youth games.

Umpires: This year during the championship it was decided to give some recognition to a group of match officials who help in the smooth running of our games. The umpires who are vital to our games have this year bee included in the match programme alongside the referees and linesmen to highlight that they are valued members of the officiating team in any game. I would like to thank the umpires who give up their time to help our referees in the championship.

On a disappointing note I would like to draw to your attention the fact that a referee appointed to an underage Grade 1 Championship final had taken time of work to collect 4 umpires from his club and travel to a venue only to be informed that one team had conceded. Match officials deserve to be treated with respect. It was also noted with regret that our referees felt disillusioned when the County Senior Hurling Final was refereed by a referee from outside our County. Whilst our own referees where appointed to take charge of the same teams playing in a League fixture.

Thanks: With all that said I would like to thank the Referees' Committee for supporting me in my role as Referees' Administrator, for their hard work and dedication to improving the standard of refereeing in Tyrone. Special thanks to all Referees who continue to give up their time and commit to the games. During the Championship I could call upon Paul Mallon, Paul Doris, Fabian McGlone, Martin Mohan and John Kerlin who were only too willing to assist our referees, your support was much appreciated thank you. Thank you to the Advisors who worked hard all year to improve the standard of refereeing in Tyrone. In concluding I would like to convey my thanks to: the County Chairman Michael Kerr, Secretary Dominic McCaughey, Treasurer Raymond McKeown and Vice Treasurer Eileen Connolly for their support throughout the year; thanks to the CCC especially



appointment officers Shane Dorrity and Eamon Kelly; and finally a word of thanks to Gregory McSorley and all the staff of Garvaghey who are only too willing to assist when required.

13.Coiste Forbartha Iomána Peadar Mac Giolla Cheara

The Hurling Development Committee for 2018 was made up of the following members; Peter Kerr(Chairman), George Byrne (Minutes Secretary), Rory Mc Callan (Fixtures Secretary), Paddy Hunter (PRO), Kevin Cunningham, Peter O'Kane, Kieran Cranney, Drew Doherty, Sheila Loughran, Ciaran Hughes, Mark Mc Laughlin, Gary Mc Gettigan, Ciaran Mc Hugh, Cathal Daly, Benny Hurl and Anne Daly. Peter Kerr represented Tyrone on the Ulster Hurling Development Committee also.

The National Hurling Development Committee at Croke Park has again financially supported our Five Year Strategic Plan with the continued provision of a hurling coach in the feeder primary schools of our new clubs in Tyrone. Éire Óg clubman, Lochrann O' Donnghaile has been appointed to this role this year. There is much good work being done in all clubs for the development of hurling in Tyrone. The following paragraphs give an idea of the development of our national game in the clubs in which it is being promoted.

2018 was another great year in terms of hurling development within our new hurling clubs in the county. It was an excellent second year in operation for Cúchulainn An Ghleanna, the hurling and camogie club that serves the Clogher Valley. Beginning with a highly-subscribed winter-spring training programme both inside, later moving to outside at St Ciaran's College in Ballygawley, the club's under-12 team secured the first trophy in the club's history in May, with the Corn Féile na Bealtaine, hosted by Tulach Óg. The club competed in many blitzes and also experienced their first competitive action in camogie at the Carrickmore blitz. The highlight of the year however was the club's first tournament which they staged on October 27th, with Eire Óg camogie, along with Middletown, Tulach Óg and Duiche Neil visiting St. Ciaran's. While the visiting teams left with both the U12 and U8 Corn Chúchulainn, the hosts won the Sciath Chúchulainn in both age groups and a total of 122 children enjoyed a morning's hurling with catering for all afterwards.

The pace of progress hasn't slowed for Tulach Óg either. The club has had coaching at MUSA every Wednesday from January through to October with 10 active and committed coaches and around 10 parent-helpers involved. A major highlight was the Féile na Bealtaine tournament in May to which U11.5 teams from all the new clubs in the Mid Ulster Council area were invited. The club took part in all the hurling Go Games blitzes throughout the year and took part in some of the camogie blitzes on offer at these age groups as well. Huge strides are being made with the U13 hurlers in the club. This group travelled to Paulstown in Kilkenny for a coaching weekend. During their stay they also played in a blitz which featured the Young Irelanders club from Gowran, the home of the renowned DJ. Carey. These boys returned home to compete in the North West U13 league, finishing runners up in Division 3.

In the Dúiche Néill club similar growth has taken place over this past year. Drawing on players from both sides of the Blackwater and basing themselves in Benburb, they have seen their membership continue to rise. They have participated in all the Go Game blitzes this year and also fielded a young U12.5 team in the Tyrone League. A pleasing factor is also the numbers of parents and coaches getting involved. The highlight for Dúiche Néill this year was the part they played in the celebration around the redevelopment of council owned playing facilities in the village. As part of this



redevelopment, local Gaelic football, camogie, soccer, rugby and Dúiche Néill's own hurling coaches provided coaching and fun games in all sports in a very successful cross community programme over the four Tuesday evenings in June.

Drumragh GAC have consolidated the work carried out last year in continuing to establish hurling at the club. The club is active at Fundamentals, U8.5 and U10.5 age groups. Support has been forthcoming from parents, and encouragement has been taken from those involved with two non-playing parents completing their foundation courses at the start of the year. Drumragh have taken part in the Go Games blitzes and have taken great encouragement from their performances. The club faces make or break decisions in the year ahead when the extent to which hurling will be accommodated as part of the core activities of the club will be debated. The answers to these questions will shape the year ahead.

Following the revival of hurling by Fintona Pearses Setanta they have completed in their fifth season in 2018. From their initial participation in U8/10 blitzes they now field teams up to U12.5 and U14. They have 40 boys and girls regularly training and playing for the Club from Fintona, Trillick, Eskra & Tattyreagh. While there are three coaches, there is a small but very active group of very supportive parents which makes progress possible. Among their highlights of the year was their entry into the U14 hurling league for the first time. Hosting their first match at St Lawrence's Park was an important milestone and even though the team was very young, they competed in every match. St Lawrence's PS participated in the Cumann na mBunscoil tournament for the first time with players and coaches from the club organising the team. Four Fintona boys are members of the County U14 Development Squad and while their participation is a great opportunity for them, it is helping to encourage and inspire younger players in the club. Their vision for the future is to introduce many more boys and girls to hurling and hopefully encourage them to keep playing. Fintona Pearses Setanta's motto is "Hurling is Fun!" as they aim to instil a love of the game for life in their members.

At Naomh Éanna, An Ómaigh, there were weekly sessions for all under age groups. Their U6s have fantastic numbers and plans are in place to ensure that next year this large group have opportunities to play in games with other clubs. The U8s attended a number of games and tournaments throughout the year. Perhaps the highlight of the year for the club was the staging of their second St Enda's Tournament in which 30 teams from the nine Ulster counties participated at U8 and U10 levels. Martin Fogarty, the National Hurling Development Officer was so impressed with what he saw last year, he was present this year again. The hardworking Omagh hurling fraternity deserve immense credit for the way in which this tournament was organised again this year. While numbers remain good up to and including U14, more games need to be provided at U16 and u18 to ensure that players progress through to play senior hurling with the club.

Killyclogher Naomh Muire had a very successful winter and spring indoor programme for U8s, U10s and U12s, competing in all blitzes. They did a great job once again in hosting the Tyrone Féile in which they themselves competed. While they did not compete at U16 and Minor levels, some of their players lined out for neighbouring clubs at these age groups. At senior level they competed in the Tyrone Junior League and in the Ulster League. They look forward to 2019, determined to build on these successes.

The highlights for Naomh Colm Cille during 2018 included new volunteers joining the committee and helping at various youth events and being successful in various grant applications. On the field NCC got encouraging attendances at u6/8/10 levels, participated in Tyrone Go Games blitzes and successfully hosted two blitzes at Páirc Chlochóg. Participating in the Antrim Senior hurling league meant a meaningful number of games were played by their senior squad. However failure to field from u14 to u18 levels in 2018 and poor participation by local schools in organised hurling



competitions are worrying trends for the club. Physical club development continued with the acquisition of buildings to expand existing facilities and the dedicated maintenance of our muchimproved pitch surface. The pinnacle of the year for Naomh Colm Cille was a trip to Croke Park to see a brilliant match, the All-Ireland hurling semi-final between Cork v Limerick that inspired all who travelled.

Strabane Shamrocks are currently experiencing difficulties as they look to begin a rebuilding process. Attracting personnel onto their committee has become difficult in recent years resulting in a very small committee. On the field of play, they have not fielded at senior level for the last four years and since they did not field at all at U14, U16 or minor level in 2018, it appears that it may be some years before they compete in adult hurling again. A few club members are trying hard to keep hurling alive but are finding it extremely difficult to attract young players to the club. While they did field at some blitzes and games at U8, U10 and U12, numbers remain low and it will take a concentrated effort from all concerned to get this once proud club back to a position of strength.

Éire Óg celebrated the completion of the second phase of their club development on the first weekend of July with the official opening of their indoor ball wall, walking and running tracks, outdoor gym, sensory garden and shed taking place on Friday 6th July and their Éire Óg 100 Club cycle taking place the following day. Páirc Éire Óg is a tremendous asset to the Carrickmore area, to Gaels of all codes, but in particular to the students of Dean Maguirc College who can now avail of this first class facility beside them. On the playing front, good strides are being made at underage with Éire Óg fielding in all competitions and playing membership continuing to rise. A particularly pleasing development has been the increased numbers of young girls playing at primary school level, and the involvement of their parents in the coaching and games.

Dungannon Eoghan Ruadh continued their development both on and off the field this year following the opening of their new facilities in 2017. The club's underage policy continues to bear fruit with success at underage level and with a steady stream of talent breaking through to their senior ranks. On facilities development, work is due to begin on a new dressing room complex, expected to cost in the region of £300k. During the past year, the club was happy to make their new facilities available to all Gaels, from a national league match between Tyrone and Warwickshire to club and school games in Gaelic football, hurling and camogie. Fellow Dungannon Gaels, Thomas Clarkes played four of their league games at Eoghan Ruadh's facility and hopefully by the summer of 2019, a new fit for purpose dressing room facility will further add to the GAA footprint in Dungannon and Tyrone.

To conclude, there have been a few very notable developments at schools level this year. During May there were three very successful schools hurling blitzes. On two Thursdays, the 17th and 24th, Garvaghey played host to two secondary schools blitzes in which Year 8s and Year 9s from secondary schools in Tyrone played for the Corn and Sciath Chineál Eoghain. Ten secondary schools participated over the two days. In the Year 8 blitz, St. Joseph's Donaghmore won the Corn Chineál Eoghain and Omagh CBS won the Sciath Chineál Eoghain . In the Year 9 blitz, Omagh CBS won the cup and St. Patrick's College, Dungannon won the shield.

The Cumann na mBunscoil blitz took place at Páirc Naomh Colmcille in Carrickmore on Tuesday 22nd May. With 24 primary schools taking part this was the biggest ever Cumann na mBunscoil hurling blitz in Tyrone. With a competitive and non-competitive section, all abilities were catered for and all schools enjoyed the day. Gaelscoil na gCrann, An Ómaigh emerged as winners after a great final with St. Brigid's, Altamuskin. Well done to all pupils and teachers for taking part in all our blitzes and thanks to all our schools coaches for organising on those days.



To conclude, a Tyrone College's team has participated in the Casement Cup, Ulster College's second tier competition at U18.5 level and at the time of submitting this report they have reached the final where they play St. Mary's College, Magherafelt. While this is the second attempt at fielding an amalgamated Tyrone schools' team in this competition, it is hoped that given the success of this year's team in reaching the final, a Tyrone College's team will continue to participate in this competition. It is certainly a bonus for players at this age to be getting hurling at this level, given the lack of provision for meaningful games at minor level within Tyrone presently. Everyone associated with Tyrone hurling would like to thank county hurling coach, Aidan Kelly for his work with them and for all his work over the past three years in his post.

14.Coiste Oiliúna Traenála & Forbartha na gCluichí Cathaoirleach: Breandán Ó hEarghaill

The Coaching and Games Sub Committee met on nine occasions during the year. The following members made up the subcommittee: Anne Daly, Benny Hurl, Orla Mc Aleer, Damian Harvey, Ryan Daly, Niall Mc Quaid, Peter Kerr, Eugene Mc Connell, Des O Doherty, Peter Donnelly, John Devlin.

We thank all of the committee for their hard work and commitment.

Games Development Administration: Anne has been Games Development Administrator for a long number of years and works tirelessly alongside all the coaches in the promotion of Gaelic Games in Tyrone. We thank her for ongoing and outstanding service, commitment to and for the promotion of Gaelic Games in Tyrone at all levels and codes.

Hurling: Peter Kerr and his committee are to be commended for their constant promotion of hurling. The energy and passion shown by Peter and his colleagues is to be applauded, recognised and encouraged as it is very pleasing to see the uplift in hurling activity throughout the county. We sincerely hope that the promotion of hurling continues to be encouraged and appropriate resources allocated to same.

Go Games: 2018 saw the delivery of a comprehensive Go Games programme which was overseen by our County coordinator Des O Doherty. The coaching and games committee wish to acknowledge the massive contribution that Des makes in the running of our Go Games programme; he works tirelessly throughout the year to ensure the smooth running of our games. Des would welcome all feedback and suggestions on how the underage programme could be improved, adapted for 2019.

Primary School Coaching Programme: Sadly the key stage one programme has now come to an end, with the programme due to officially wrap up on 14th December. We wish to acknowledge the contribution that all current and former DENI coaches have made within our Primary Schools in the County. Sadly this will leave our Schools with no GAA presence in our key stage one year groups. In June we lost Conor Hackett a valued member of our coaching staff team, to date we are still awaiting the replacement of Conor. This has had a major knock on effect on our Schools in the North/West Tyrone area where there currently is no GAA presence which should be a major concern for all schools and clubs in that area. Aidy Kelly is leaving his post at the end of November. We wish Aidy every best wish and extend a massive thanks to him for the valued role that he has played over the past number of years in the promotion and development of Hurling within the County. The importance of strong Club School links is vital to ensuring the continued growth and development of Gaelic Games within our Primary Schools. With limited coaching resources now available to Schools all Clubs are urged to look at providing additional coaching support to help nurture the talent present. County management and county committee should be looking seriously at measures to reduce the impact of the loss of the School's Curriculum Programme.



Cumann na mBunscol: Despite an expressed view that Cumann na mBunscol have nothing to do with Tyrone GAA, Tyrone GAA are extremely fortunate to have such an organisation made up of highly motivated, energetic and passionate Gaels, whose sole focus is to promote Gaelic games throughout all of the schools in Tyrone on a voluntary basis. The CNMB organisation in Tyrone is amongst the strongest and most active units throughout the whole of the country and they are a shining example of all that is good about the GAA and games promotion. A lot of the time, their work is seen at half time games at provincial finals, all Ireland semi-finals and finals but that would be doing them a disservice as they provide opportunities for thousands of children on a daily and weekly basis. Their contribution to the development of Gaelic games simply cannot be overstated and at a time when the department of education sees fit to remove the funding to the Curriculum Sports Programme, the importance of Tyrone CNMB has now grown immeasurably and has taken on an even greater importance. In addition, a large number of those in the organisation will wear a number of hats and will have 2,3 and maybe 4 roles within their school, club and county set ups.

Consequently, it is paramount that Tyrone GAA along with all the clubs form a strategic long term partnership with Tyrone CNMB and share a vision whereby the School's Curriculum programme is seen as merely an added bonus if it ever returns. Meanwhile Tyrone GAA should be working closely with the clubs, Tyrone CNMB committee and others to ensure that the promotion of Gaelic games is not only maintained but enhanced throughout every primary school in Tyrone. We wish to acknowledge the contribution that Niall Mc Quaid has made to coaching and games as delegate to coaching and games and it was nice to see Niall's service to Tyrone GAA recognised in the form of an award for his work in the promotion of games.

It would be remiss not to acknowledge the work of all the teachers in all our schools throughout Tyrone at all levels. The Tyrone CNMB have a very hard working committee whose work is very much appreciated and we thank you all for your continued commitment to Tyrone GAA. Brian Mc Gurk is a very able chairperson who has provided great commitment and leadership as chair. At this stage the work of Rúnaí Eddie Doris is legendary and once again we wish to give special mention to this very special individual.

Clubs: Clubs are the real driving forces of the promotion of games throughout the county. Sincere thanks and appreciation is extended to all the clubs and club coaches in all codes for their commitment to Gaelic games and their support of all the initiatives by the county.

Coach Education Programme: During the year we delivered seven Foundation Award Courses, two Award One Courses and one Award Two Course. The County will host a Coaching Conference on Saturday 1st December, titled 'Developing Creative Coaches'. This is an event not to be missed by our Club Coaches, advance booking is required.

GAA for All Programme: The GAA for All programme continued during the year with the highlights of the year being to participate in the half time games at the Ulster Senior Championship Semi Final between Monaghan and Fermanagh and the GAA for All day to Croke Park. Our aim for 2019 is to build upon the structures that are currently in place so as to encourage more children and adults to get involved in the coaching and games programme.

Summer Camps: During the Summer of 2018 we ran 43 Club Tyrone Camps with a total attendance of 4241 children whilst 1066 children attended the Kellogg's Camps which were run at 11 different venues. Preparations are commencing shortly for the 2019 Camps, we would welcome all feedback from Clubs on changes that they would like to see made to the Summer Camp programme including content etc.



Tyrone Academies: Academies are continuing to grow in strength. The relationships with Clubs and schools are progressing well and all three are working collectively with each other.

The GAA at national level, on foot of a GAA funded study by Cork man Brian Cuthbert, recently undertook a Player Pathway review, essentially a review of talent academies / development squads. Tyrone Academy would have serious concerns in relation to the ongoing review of the Academy structures and player pathway. Tyrone were consulted on 7th November.

At the recent review it was pleasing to hear of the good relations between all stakeholders especially the clubs and schools and the role of Ryan Daly in this was generally and publicly recognised and acknowledged as being the glue that binds together the Tyrone Academy and is the main conduit between the clubs, schools and the Academy itself. Ryan's role has made the Tyrone Academy a successful and worthwhile venture.

The current structure focuses on approximately 180 players between 14-17 years of age. The lads are educated in S&C, nutrition and hydration, game sense and skill execution under pressure. Our Academy continues to work inside the National boundaries set by Croke Park - with U14 and U15 squads meeting 16 times a season. With U16s competing in Provincial tournaments - the season consisted of 30 sessions.

Player Development still continues to be the sole focus of our academy - parents play a huge role in this process and this season we have focused hard on building relationships and providing advice on aiding their child's development.

To progress our players - a common approach between games programmes at county and provincial level is a must. Players are being put under serious pressure with club minor and county minor competitions being running during the same period and on top of this is the Ulster Colleges football programme.

Special thanks to the coaches who have continuously supported the academy throughout the season. Their input is invaluable and greatly appreciated.

Thanks also to all second level schools and the teachers who promote our games.

Thanks to Garvaghey management committee for the use of the facilities and to all our other facility partners. Thanks to all the staff in Garvaghey and in particular the hard work of Gregory Mc Sorley.

Ryan Daly: Although his official title is second level coach, Ryan has almost single handedly led the Tyrone Academy as well as forging very successful relationships with the schools and teachers. Ryan's knowledge of players and all other stakeholders has been invaluable and his passion and energy should be acknowledged by all.

Ryan has indicated to Tyrone GAA that he will no longer be working for Tyrone GAA and this comes as a major blow and a huge disappointment to all. We simply cannot and should not "get someone else" to do the job as has been suggested and the resignation of Ryan Daly should be met with real



concern by everyone. Clubs, schools and the Tyrone Academy will be left without someone of his stature and ability. It is hoped that the issues that are contributing to the high level of staff turnover are addressed to prevent even more staff leaving. The HR review process which started last October and was to last 6 weeks has not been completed and although some would say that HR should be no concern of Coaching and Games, we would say otherwise, especially when staff are leaving. The resignation of Ryan Daly should be a watershed moment for Tyrone GAA.

Full time staff: Thanks to all of the full time coaching staff. Your contribution to the promotion of Gaelic Game in Tyrone is not fully recognised and your roles are not fully appreciated. You work sometimes in difficult situations and we would appeal to everyone to help make your roles a little bit easier so that the promotion of our games is enhanced and that your contribution as staff members is acknowledged and appreciated by all. It is a matter of regret that staff turnover in Coaching and Games in Tyrone is quite high. The following all have left their posts in the recent past: Ryan Daly – December 18 * see Academy report, Aidy Kelly – Nov 18, Conor Hackett – June 18, Ronan Mc Namee – April 2017, Ronan Devlin August 16, Angela Stevenson April 16, John Devlin - October 15, Geraldine Christie - Aug 14.

Support: Thanks to the support given by county management, county committee, Club Tyrone and Dragons, clubs, parents, players, coaches during the year. It's a team effort and the promotion and development of coaching and games can only be carried out in cooperation of everyone.

The CCC met with the Fixture Planners in January to draw up the annual Fixtures Plan. This was presented to clubs on 7th February. The plan was met with the general approval of the clubs, with the SFC & IFC to take place in early September while the JFC would commence in late August at the completion of the league season, primarily due to the Ulster JFC commencing 2 weeks earlier this year. The main issue flagged up at the meeting with the clubs was numbers at underage level, with several clubs indicating they would struggle to field at several age-groups at 13 a side. After some discussion, it was agreed that the CCC would look at the re-introduction of an 11-a-side Grade 4 competition where the demand was sufficient.

Adult Football

The Adult leagues commenced on Saturday 31st March. While the initial plan aimed to complete the Division 1 & 2 Leagues prior to the Championship, the run of our Senior Football team to the All-Ireland Final meant that this had to be revised to ensure that we had representatives to participate in the Ulster Club Championship. The success of the Senior team also meant that there was a void without first team football during the summer months in these Divisions. While this gap was filled with the Reserve Knockout competition, it still meant that many players did not see action during the best months of the year. This is something that will need be addressed in the year ahead. For the first time in several years, there were no County Senior players from Division 3 clubs, which enabled the League to be run off in a smooth fashion, providing regular games for all Junior players over the summer months and for the league to be completed before the commencement of the Junior Championship.

Our Club Championship had new sponsors for the 2018 with the LCC Group coming on board. The new sponsorship deal gave us the opportunity to break new ground by streaming our Club Championship draw on Facebook Live, which proved to be a great success. Our thanks are extended to the Loughran family for their kind sponsorship and thanks also to our liaison with LCC Group, CCC Vice Chairman Adrian Scullin for all his hard work over the course of the season.

After the positive feedback from the two games streamed via Armagh TV in 2017, it was a very positive step to see the County take its first steps into live streaming in 2018. Thanks for Gerard Bradley and the IT committee, Eugene McConnell and the Communications Committee and Raymond McKeown for all their hard work to get the streaming service up and running.

Our Club Championship was, once again, a tremendous success and gave us plenty of classic matches and memorable moments over the course of the year. The prolonged Inter County season meant that the regulation governing Extra-Time at the games had to be used to ensure our Championships were kept on schedule. Youth Football

After discussion at the end of the 2017 season, the season commenced with the Under 21 Knockout competition in a new slot in the calendar, beginning in late January. This change of slot has proven to be a great success in its opening year, with a large reduction in the number of games that were conceded in the competition. Given its success, it is envisioned that the Under 21 Knockout will remain in this slot for the year ahead. Congratulations to our winners Dromore St Dympna's and Moy Tir na nOg.

The Minor Football League commenced on 18th March, however inclement weather wreaked havoc on the early stages of the competition and coupled with changes to the provincial competition structures which moved both the Minor Championship and the U16 Buncrana Cup to earlier in year and the MacLarnon and All-Ireland success of Holy Trinity College it meant that it was difficult to for games to be rescheduled and it prolonged the competition a number of weeks which in turn impacted on the Under 16 competition commencing. Congratulations to our Grade 1 Minor Championship winners Errigal Ciaran and Grade 1 Minor League winners Dungannon Clarkes and to our Grade 2, 3 and 4 double winners Trillick St Macartan's, Kildress Wolfe Tones and Drumquin Wolfe Tones.

The year ahead

While the National or Provincial fixture plan has not been released at the time of this report, it is obvious at this early stage that there is going to be additional pressure on our fixtures programme for the year ahead. Tyrone's participation in the Preliminary Round of the Ulster Championship will likely see the Ulster Championship campaign begin a week earlier in 2019 which will leave less games played than in 2018 before we must begin using the starred fixtures. The proposed changes to the Under 20s competition is also likely to have implications on availability of dates and players. After the recent meeting with the clubs and fixture planners, which wanted to remain the 3 Division



league structure, the CCC will attempt to balance the starred fixtures better in the year ahead with games held for July and August and will meet with the clubs as early as possible in the new year.

6.17 Age Grades

Club

Adult

A player shall have celebrated his 17th birthday prior to January 1st of the Championship Year.

Under Age Grades

A County shall determine its internal Under Age Grades for competition purposes within the parameter of Under 21 down to Under 11, subject to the following eligibility years' span:

Under 21 - A five years' span.

Under 20 down to Under 14/13 - A four years' span.

Under 12/11 - A three years' span.

A county shall retain the discretion to set its own Under Age Grades for its internal competitions and it shall also be allowed to deviate in its internal competitions from the 1st January start of year date as stated in the "Definition of Span - Example" given in T.O.2018.
